## Quick Glance: First 180 Days



Over 8,000 bills introduced thus far, about 27 bills enacted

#### Major pieces of legislation include:

- Full-Year Continuing Appropriations and Extensions Act of 2025
- One Big Beautiful Reconciliation Act
- Rescissions Act of 2025
- GENIUS Act of 2025

Myriad of Executive Orders signed by President Trump

Presidential appointments confirmation hearings in the Senate



## **Budget Reconciliation Act / H.R. 1**



- Signed into law on July 4, 2025, effective 45 days from the date of signing. The bill included extensions for many provisions from the 2017 Tax Cuts and Jobs Act that were set to expire at the end of 2025.
- "Appropriations" and "reconciliation" are two separate processes that Congress uses to achieve different goals. Appropriations fund discretionary programs.
- The budget reconciliation is a fast-track legislative process that enables
   Congress to make changes to spending, revenue (taxes), and/or the
   federal debt limit. Reconciliation is considered under special rules (i.e., Byrd
   Rule, filibuster proof in the Senate.

## H.R. 1 / Provisions of Interest



#### **Opportunities**

- Maintains the tax exemption for municipal bonds
- Permanent extension of the Low-Income Housing Tax Credit (LIHTC)
- Permanent extension of New Market Tax Credits
- Permanent extension of the Opportunity Zones program
- No moratorium on state and local regulation of artificial intelligence
- A \$625 million appropriation for Homeland Security grants to FIFA 2026
   World Cup host cities



## H.R. 1 / Provisions of Interest



#### **Setbacks**

- Rescission of unobligated balances (although it does not deauthorize programs) from almost all Inflation Reduction Act grant programs, including:
  - Neighborhood Access and Equity, the Greenhouse Gas Reduction Fund, Climate Pollution Reduction Grants, Green and Resilient Retrofit for Multifamily Housing, and Diesel Emission Reduction Grants.
- Reductions in Medicaid spending (approx. \$1 trillion) and reductions in SNAP spending (approx. \$186 billion) through 2034 by limiting future increases to the cost of the Thrifty Food Plan and passing costs onto states.

## **FY26 Appropriations**



- The FY26 Appropriations process is currently underway in Congress. Lawmakers are operating under strict caps on non-defense discretionary spending, which could significantly affect programs that are important to the City.
- The FY26 federal fiscal year is set to begin on October 1. However, in recent years, Congress has failed to meet this deadline, instead relying on Continuing Resolutions (CRs) to maintain funding at existing levels and prevent government shutdowns.
- Community Project Funding requests are considered as part of the Appropriations legislation.

## FY26 Community Project Funding



- This year, the City of Dallas submitted 28
   Community Project Funding requests to the Dallas delegation for consideration in FY26.
- Community project funding requests (also known as earmarks) are requests that members of Congress submit to the House or Senate Appropriations Committees to direct federal funds toward specific local projects in their districts or states, as part of the annual appropriations process.
- As of today, **17** City of Dallas projects have made it into draft appropriations legislation.



## City of Dallas 2025 Federal Legislative Program

Provide additional tools for local law enforcement agencies to ensure public safety for Dallas.

Increase funding for Urban Area Security Initiative (UASI).

Increase protections and resources for domestic violence and human trafficking survivors.

Modernize law enforcement tools to include safer technologies.



Secure protections for residents at greatest risk of displacement and tools to address affordable housing.

Expand tools for seniors to age in place.

Modernize and increase funding for HOME / CDBG / LIHTC.

Seek funding for homelessness services, including cost recovery for unsheltered services provided by certain municipalities.



Promotes job creation and private investment to grow the tax base and create economic opportunities.

Strengthen Dallas' workforce development pipeline.

Expand broadband connectivity for all residents.



Deliver effective and efficient government services, while being fiscally responsible.

Maintain tax exemption for municipal bonds, including private activity bonds, and reinstate advance refunding for municipal bonds.

Protect resident and commercial data.


