The OCPO's primary function is to monitor DPD investigations of external administrative complaints or critical incidents, oversee mediations; independently investigate administrative investigations upon the conclusion of an internal affairs investigation (case disposition and discipline); review findings of internal affairs investigations or investigations of critical incidents and report the findings to the board; provide support services to the board such as aiding the board and the technical resource panel in their work; and assist the board with preparing reports. The OCPO does not represent complainants or assist in any monetary recovery or other damages sought by a complainant.

Handgun Prohibition Notice for Meetings **of Governmental Entities**

I. Call to Order & Roll Call

(Chairman John Mark Davidson)

Chairman Davidson announces the official time for the Board Meeting is 5:30 pm.

II. Purpose of the CPOB

(Chairman John Mark Davidson)

The **Chairman** opens with the purpose of the board:

- a. The mission of the Community Police Oversight Board (CPOB), formerly known as the Civilian Review Board, is to enhance the public's trust that complaints of misconduct against Dallas Police Department (DPD) employees are conducted fairly and thoroughly, are transparent, and ensure the City of Dallas residents have an accessible means to the complaint process. To help ensure this accountability, the Office of Community Police Oversight (OCPO) provides functional support and technical assistance to the CPOB.

Chairman Davidson proceeds to the public comment segment and makes an exception to having only 5 public comments at the beginning, allowing for one more, thereby increasing the total to 6.

III. Public Comment / Open Microphone

(3 Minutes Per Person)

- a. During the open microphone period at the beginning of each Board meeting, up to five people are allowed to speak. Those who wish to speak must register prior to the meeting's start. Speaker registration will open 15 minutes prior to the start of the Board meeting. Each person who speaks at a public meeting must state his or her name, address, and, if applicable, who he or she represents. The first five registered speakers will be called in the order they signed up to speak at the beginning of the meeting.

Nora Soto is called first by the Chairman but is not present for public comment.

Ella Haag: Highlighted a perceived contradiction between the City of Dallas' celebration of immigrant communities and recent incidents involving ICE enforcement. She cited videos and eyewitness accounts near Lake June and Jim Miller showing DPD officers "standing around watching" while ICE agents "abducted" individuals, arguing this demonstrates "proof of collusion" despite the City Police Chief Comeaux stating he declined the 287(g) agreement offer. Haag said these actions are "breaking any community trust that existed," traumatizing residents, and discouraging people from going to work. She questioned how DPD is trained to handle ICE interactions, asked "what else is ICE asking of DPD," and requested monthly reporting on the "frequency, purpose, and results" of any DPD support to ICE. She concluded by urging the Board to act, asking whether it will "watch the city burn or help us stomp it out."

Azael Alvarez: (Video brought in by Mr. Alvarez was shown.) After showing a video from two weeks prior in Pleasant Grove near Lake June and Jim Miller, Azael Alvarez relayed DPD's public explanation that officers were told the individuals involved were ICE agents and that DPD's "only role was to maintain safety for all parties." Alvarez argued that encounters like this undermine DPD's efforts to build trust with the Latino community and raise "very serious public safety issues." He questioned DPD's protocol for verifying the "identity and lawful authority" of masked individuals claiming

to be ICE agents, and what officers are instructed to do when bystanders believe “a crime is happening in real time.” Alvarez described feeling unsafe and “antagonized for asking questions,” and warned against “normalizing masked, unidentified men detaining people while police stand by.” He concluded that if DPD does not verify who is “behind the mask,” it enables impersonation and “should terrify every single person in this city.”

Jennifer Walker: Jennifer Walker stated that the previously shown video related to DPD and ICE “went viral,” citing over “6,200 likes,” nearly “1,000 comments,” and more than “1,500 shares,” and read sample comments expressing anger, distrust, and accusations that police “stood by while two people were abducted.” She said the volume and tone of public reaction show widespread concern about “the extent of DPD’s role,” officer training, and whether internal policies are being followed. Referencing the police chief’s stated priorities of “transparency, community engagement, and hiring,” Walker argued that transparency is essential to rebuilding trust. She formally requested that the CPOB add a standing monthly agenda item requiring DPD to report on ICE-related calls and encounters, incident summaries and outcomes, officer training and policy guidance on immigration-related situations, and that the CPOB submit a monthly summary to the Public Safety Committee to improve public understanding, accountability, and alignment with city policy.

John Putnam is called first by the Chairman but is not present for public comment.

Nohelli Estrada: A District 11 resident, described participating in early-morning community watch efforts in District 5, which she said has become “one of the most vulnerable areas.” She recounted witnessing a November 26 incident near Lake June involving “masked men wearing vests” detaining a community member who appeared to be “just pumping gas” and later identifying themselves as ICE. Estrada said police officers were present but appeared “calm,” questioned community members about why they were there, and made her feel “ridiculed” and unsafe when she sought answers, including asking for a warrant. She expressed concern that DPD, while “not directly acting as ICE,” is still assisting ICE and undermining trust. Estrada requested greater transparency, including adding ICE activity to monthly district reports, reviewing protocols for these encounters, and improving how officers respond when fearful residents report being followed, speaking “on behalf of every immigrant in this city who is living fearful.”

Nora Soto: A District 4 resident, criticized the police chief for not attending CPOB meetings and accused him of “publicly” denying and “lying” about DPD’s collaboration with ICE. She recounted confronting the chief at a budget town hall and said she was escorted out after asserting that cooperation with ICE was occurring. Soto argued that any existing trust between police and the community was already “very unstable” and had been further damaged by ICE-related activity. She contended that officers lack adequate training for routine public interactions and are even less prepared for “chaotic” ICE-related situations, which she said increases the risk of harm and legal liability, citing lawsuits in other jurisdictions. Soto also questioned the department’s priorities, saying officers are being diverted from patrols, despite emphasis on “lower

response times”, to assist or “act as bodyguards” for ICE agents. She concluded by demanding greater transparency and calling on the DPD to “stop working with ICE.”

John Putnam: A District 10 resident raised concerns about ongoing DPD cooperation with ICE despite more than “60 residents” speaking against the 287(g) agreement and expressing fear of “masked ICE agents” in their neighborhoods. He questioned why community members have documented police assisting ICE in apprehensions, arguing that such cooperation erodes trust and makes people less likely to seek help from DPD. Putnam emphasized the legal right to record law enforcement as essential for accountability, noting that abuses have only been addressed when “witnesses recorded and documented” them. Citing the Brennan Center for Justice, he warned that ICE surveillance spending and access to technologies like Flock cameras and Veil Dallas sites create a “chilling effect” on First Amendment rights and police oversight. He called for monthly reporting on all formal and informal ICE requests for DPD support and questioned why ICE has access to city tracking technologies without judicial warrants.

Chairman Davidson thanked the speakers and acknowledged the seriousness of the concerns raised, stating that the Board “cares deeply about this issue” and that the public “came to the right place.” He said the comments provided “great ideas” for consideration, particularly regarding potential reporting from the Police Department and keeping the issue “in the public eye.” Davidson noted that a report on Flock cameras was scheduled later on in the agenda. He also shared that the video shown during public comment was “disturbing” and confirmed that a formal complaint has been filed with the OCPO and referred to IAD, where it is currently “in review,” adding that there would be an opportunity to discuss the matter at a later time once the review process proceeds.

Brandon Friedman (D14) thanked the speakers and echoed the chairman’s remarks, noting that “thousands of people feel as you do” and appreciating those who had shown up to speak. He said he has reviewed the videos and heard the police chief’s statements about ICE, but stated that regardless of whether DPD is “just setting a perimeter,” officers “don’t need to have anything to do with ICE.” Friedman emphasized that DPD’s primary responsibility is to “protect Dallas residents” and argued that until response times improve, DPD should not be involved with ICE at all. He supported residents’ requests for transparency and called for a monthly briefing from DPD on any collaboration with ICE so the Board has visibility and can provide feedback.

IV. Approval of November 10, 2025, CPOB Regular Meeting Minutes

- a. **Action:** Vote to approve the minutes from the regular meeting of the CPOB held

Motion: Jennifer King (D10) moves to approve the minutes.

Second: Lauren Gilbert-Smith (D4) seconds the motion.

Vote: Unanimous

V. Update on the request for 911 emergency response times data and priority call data. (Assistant Director Robert Uribe & Policy Analyst Siara Obasuyi)

Assistant Director Uribe was not able to be present, so Policy Analyst Siara Obasuyi proceeded with the follow-up information.

Policy Analyst Siara Obasuyi presented data requested by the Board comparing DPD priority call volume and average response times, noting that DPD data is aggregated by patrol division rather than council district. A reference table showing which council districts fall within each patrol division was provided in the board binders. The memo covers priority call volume and response times only for Fiscal years 2023 to 2025; call-to-arrest data will be pursued in January. Data was sourced from the 911 Emergency Communications Center. Across all patrol divisions, Priority Two calls represented the highest call volume, with response times varying significantly by division and generally increasing over time. Chairman Davidson interjected while Obasuyi was reading the report and thanked staff for compiling the data. The Chairman mentioned that the Board reviewed the document and said that the information was useful.

Chairman Davidson acknowledges Board Member Walter “Changa” Higgins at the meeting on the Webex virtual platform. (approx. 6:03pm). The segment is open for questions from the board.

The Board discussed DPD response time data and sought clarification on call priority definitions. **Jennifer King (D10)** inquired about the definition of “urgent” (Priority Two) calls, citing poor response times for Priority Two calls citywide. Executive Assistant Chief Monique Alex explained that Priority One calls involve life-or-death situations, Priority Two (urgent) calls are not life-threatening but still require police response, and lower priorities (e.g., Priority Four) include non-emergency issues such as loud music.

Jonathan Maples (D2) confirmed that call-to-arrest data will be presented in January and suggested that future ICE-related reporting also be broken down by council district; the Chair noted this request. **Chairman Davidson** emphasized that response times are the number one complaint received by OCPO, acknowledged mixed trends across divisions, and expressed interest in inviting Director Uribe to discuss strategies to improve response times. **Executive Assistant Chief Alex** stated that the Chief has challenged patrol commanders to implement strategies to reduce response times. The Chair indicated the Board will continue the discussion in future meetings.

VI. Presentation: Flock Camera – Automated License Plate Reader (ALPR) (Sergeant Adam Reinhart)

The briefing will provide an overview of the ALPR system, including deployment updates, data policies, operational results, and community transparency efforts. It will also address privacy safeguards, data retention periods, and their influence on public safety.

A presentation was made regarding Flock Cameras by Sergeant Reinhart, and Major Greer was also present. PowerPoint was provided in the agenda packet.

Sergeant Adam Reinhart provided an overview of DPD's Flock license plate reader (LPR) program, explaining that it captures license plates and vehicle descriptors only, not faces, names, or driver images, and is limited to public rights-of-way. Access is restricted to trained DPD personnel. All searches require a reason and case number, and activity is fully logged and audited. Data is retained for 365 days, unless it is preserved as evidence. DPD does not share data with private entities and currently shares it with only one federal agency, the U.S. Postal Inspector's Office. Reinhart said camera placement is based on crime patterns and investigative value, and the system supports real-time alerts, investigations, and case-building. He cited a 2024 stolen-vehicle case to illustrate how a Flock alert helped officers intervene before a suspected violent crime occurred.

Chairman Davidson opened this segment for questions from the board, and these are some of the questions that were asked:

Dr. Lauren Gilbert Smith (D4): Asked whether protective orders trigger alerts within 500 feet of a residence.

Answer: Alerts trigger when a flagged vehicle passes a Flock camera, not by distance from a residence.

Jennifer King (D10): Asked whether ICE has requested Flock data; asked about data retention; asked who can access Flock data, and how alerts work.

Answer: No ICE requests received; data is retained for 365 days unless preserved for investigations; approved agencies access data through the platform; officers receive real-time alerts via mobile/in-car systems.

Vice Chair A. Smith (D1): Asked about data-sharing firewalls, sheriff departments, and indirect sharing with ICE.

Answer: Sharing occurs only with approved agencies through the platform; the only federal agency approved is the U.S. Postal Inspection Service. DPD will provide a list of sheriff's offices with which it shares information.

Derek Pegram (D6): Asked about camera orientation and whether cameras capture faces.

Answer: Cameras are oriented to capture rear license plates; capturing faces is not intentional.

Board Member Higgins (D3): Asked about national concerns with LPR technology, volume of scans, demographics/location analysis, correlation of alerts to arrests, number of cameras, and protective-order alerts.

Answer: DPD monitors national issues; the scan numbers shown were annual totals. Demographic/location analysis may be reviewed if requested. Alert-to-arrest correlation is limited by current systems; alerts do trigger when flagged vehicles pass cameras, with over 600+ cameras citywide.

Brandon Freeman (D14): Asked about Flock's access to DPD data and hypothetical sharing with federal agencies.

Answer: Flock access is limited to maintenance/service; DPD data remains in DPD's environment; agreements prohibit unauthorized sharing.

Jonathan Maples (D2): Asked about LPR technology on patrol vehicles, officer access to alerts, placement criteria, review frequency, spacing, and community/HOA requests.

Answer: Patrol cars utilized LPR via Axon; officers must have accounts to receive alerts. Camera placement is based on crime data and funding, and locations are reviewed at installation, not routinely relocated, to ensure spacing avoids redundancy.

VII. Presentation: Unmanned Aircraft Systems (UAS) Program (Major Benny Handly)

The briefing will give an overview of the Dallas Police Department's use of UAS, also known as drone technology, for situational awareness, evidence collection, search and rescue efforts, and critical incident support. Representatives will cover unit capabilities, FAA compliance, policy guidelines, training standards, and community privacy concerns.

Major Benny Hanley of the Special Operations Division provided an overview of the DPD's Unmanned Aircraft Systems (drones). The program aims to enhance officer and public safety, support tactical operations, crime scene documentation, disaster response, missing persons searches, and traffic crash reconstruction. DPD currently has 156 certified UAS pilots and 186 visual observers operating a fleet of drones for outdoor and indoor tactical and patrol use. Flights follow FAA regulations, staying below 400 feet and maintaining line-of-sight, with indoor flights exempt. Privacy is protected under the Texas Privacy Act, which limits recording to felonies, life-threatening situations, warrant executions, or with the consent of the individual being recorded. The program logs and reports flights for transparency. UAS activity in FY 2024 included over 10,900 patrol flights, nearly 600 vehicle crime flights, and over 3,000 UAS squad flights. Next steps include deploying tethered drones for rapid visual access, expanding first responder drone programs, integrating UAS into additional units, and conducting annual refresher training.

Chairman Davidson opened this segment for questions from the board, and these are some of the questions that were asked:

J. Victor Lander (District 8): Asked if SWAT drones can reproduce sound or are weaponized.

Major Hanley: Drones only capture video; they do not reproduce sound or carry weapons.

Walter “Changa” Higgins (D3) (online): Asked about facial recognition, data usage, sharing with other agencies, deployment criteria, and demographics of operations.

Major Hanley: Drones do not have facial recognition; they may record people but cannot identify them. Deployment occurs only for planned events, tactical operations, civil unrest, crime scenes, disaster response, missing persons, or traffic reconstruction. Any supervisor can authorize a drone under these criteria. Privacy is governed by the Texas Privacy Act; recording occurs only in cases involving felonies, life-threatening situations, warrants, or with the individual's consent.

Jonathan Maples (District 2): Raised concerns about privacy and data sharing, especially regarding potential federal access.

Major Hanley: Acknowledged concerns, agreed that a deeper review is needed, and noted that all operations comply with departmental policy.

Overall, the board emphasized the need for ongoing oversight of privacy, deployment criteria, and data security for all UAS operations.

VIII. Presentation: Facial Recognition Technology (Sergeant Brandon Griffin and Lieutenant Rene Sigala)

The briefing will provide a comprehensive overview of the Dallas Police Department’s current and planned utilization of facial recognition technologies, encompassing use-case limitations, investigative protocols, vendor platforms, data security measures, and necessary oversight mechanisms. The presentation will highlight safeguards against bias, transparency initiatives, and accountability procedures.

Sergeant Griffin and Lieutenant Sigala outlined the Dallas Police Department’s use of investigative facial recognition technology as a limited, lead-generating tool managed by the Fusion Center. Technology uses still images and open-source comparisons to assist investigations into Class B misdemeanors and above, imminent public safety threats, and identification of deceased or incapacitated persons. Use requires supervisor approval, analyst review, peer review, and documentation, and it cannot serve as the sole probable cause for arrest. DPD emphasized strong privacy safeguards: no live feeds, no crowd monitoring, no First Amendment surveillance, no

automated or camera-based facial recognition, and no data sharing with federal agencies. All analysts receive extensive training on bias and accuracy, and all uses are logged and reported. Since October 2024, DPD received 156 requests, most of which produced no leads, while some advanced investigations or resulted in arrests, demonstrating controlled, case-specific use with ongoing oversight.

Chairman Davidson opened this segment for questions from the board, and these are some of the questions that were asked:

Brandon Friedman (D14): Asked whether facial recognition was vital to the 25 arrests.

Sgt. Griffin: Yes, detectives said it was important and instrumental to those arrests.

Brian Bah (District 5): Asked why seven requests were denied.

Sgt. Griffin: They did not meet policy criteria or lacked required supervisor approval.

Jennifer King (D10): Asked when DPD began using the technology.

Sgt. Griffin: October 2024.

Jonathan Maples (District 2): Asked about use on live feeds and civil rights implications.

Sgt. Griffin: No live or automated facial recognition; only still images submitted by detectives, with human analysts making comparisons. General orders are updated as technology evolves.

J. Victor Lander (District 8): Asked about data retention.

Sgt. Griffin: Retention follows state law and the requesting unit's evidence requirements, tied to the specific offense.

Derek Pegram (District 6): Asked if a known suspect would be identified during crowd monitoring.

Sgt. Griffin: No, facial recognition is not run on live feeds or crowd monitoring.

Mr. Higgins: Asked where the data is housed and what software is used.

Sgt. Griffin: Logs are housed at the Fusion Center; images are stored in DPD's Clearview instance; Clearview only provides candidate images, not identification.

Ms. King (follow-up): Asked about 28 CFR Part 23.

Sgt. Griffin: It is the federal privacy standard governing Fusion Center data handling.

Board Member (unnamed): Asked about video sources and image handling.

Sgt. Griffin: Only still images are used, sourced from investigators (e.g., screenshots), not full videos; results are peer reviewed.

Jonathan Maples (final): Asked about overlapping with drone technology.

Sgt. Griffin: No remembered instances of drone imagery being used for facial recognition.

IX. Internal Affairs Division (IAD) Report (Major Juan Salas)

- a. The Internal Affairs Division (IAD) provides briefings on the Dallas Police Department and IAD activities and continues to collaborate and partner with the OCPO and CPOB.

Major Salas (IAD): Reported no major updates; invited board to Jan. 8 VR training at the academy; encouraged visits to IAD; noted continued monthly coordination with OCPO.

Jonathan Maples (D2): Asked whether ICE must show proof of identity to DPD officers.

Asst. Chief Israel Herrera: ICE does not have to show credentials; they may operate undercover, though they often display identifying markings. Acknowledging this can raise concerns about safety and public confusion.

Judge Lander (D8): Asked if it is legal to be masked and armed, and whether officers would question such individuals.

Asst. Chief Israel Herrera: It is legal in Texas; however, it raises suspicion, and officers may approach to determine what is happening. No policy prohibits masks.

J. Victor Lander (D8): Questioned arrests without warrants and DPD's role when federal law is enforced locally.

Asst. Chief Israel Herrera: Acknowledged concerns but noted ICE enforces federal law, not DPD; discussion exceeded IAD agenda scope.

Dr. Lauren Gilbert Smith (D4): Asked if a citizen with a license to carry may act in self-defense if threatened by masked individuals.

Major Salas: Yes, self-defense is lawful in such a hypothetical scenario.

Chairman Davidson: Closed the discussion and thanked Major Salas and staff.

X. Office of Community Police Oversight Staff Report

- a. Directors' Report (Director Michele Andre)

An update highlighting the Board and staff activities, as well as changes being considered to Chapter 37, "Police," of the City Code in the omnibus ordinance, which is scheduled for consideration by the City Council on December 10, 2025. The update also includes a report on internal operations, staffing, upcoming events, and meetings.

OCPO Director Michele Andre reported on proposed City Code amendments affecting the Community Police Oversight Board and Technical Resource Panel, noting the changes align language with federal grant compliance requirements without altering board operations or prohibiting diversity. She shared that the OCPO remains fully staffed, is preparing its annual report for board review ahead of the January 13 meeting, and continues strong community engagement and interdepartmental coordination, including upcoming VR-based training at the DPD Academy. Director Andre also highlighted new transparency efforts, including redesigned online forms and the launch of a public-facing Transparency and Accountability Dashboard, which provides accessible data on complaints and outcomes, with a public awareness campaign forthcoming.

Following Director Andres' report, the Chair opened the floor for questions, but none were raised.

Jonathan Maples (D2) offered remarks commending Director Andre for her leadership and the significant progress made by OCPO, expressing pride in her work and appreciation for her efforts, both visible and behind the scenes. Chairman Davidson voiced agreement as well.

The Chairman thanked Director Andre and moved the meeting to the next agenda item.

b. Special Investigator Report

(Investigator Greg Huff)

i. Critical Incident Notification

1. For transparency, OCPO reports to the Board at the following monthly meeting whenever a critical incident occurs.

- a. November 24, 2025, Officer Involved Shooting** – At approximately 2 a.m., Dallas Police responded to a disturbance on the 2000 block of Commerce Street. The Department confirms that an officer-involved shooting occurred after officers confronted an armed suspect during the disturbance, in which multiple people were shot. The suspect died at the scene. One victim also died at the scene, and several others were transported to the hospital in stable condition. No officers were injured. This is an ongoing investigation.

After Investigator Huff's summary of the critical incident, a video was shown featuring body-worn camera footage from the night of the incident.

After the critical incident video was shown, Chairman Davidson noted that the matter remains an active investigation and that responses to questions may be limited.

J. Victor Lander (D8): asked whether all injuries were caused by the perpetrator of the incident. **Investigator Huff** responded that, to his knowledge, all injuries were attributable to the perpetrator. No further questions were raised.

Chairman Davidson: announced the consideration of two independent investigation cases previously authorized by the Board for full review by OCPO. He explained that OCPO would present a full report on each case, after which the Board would vote on whether to accept the findings. If accepted, the report would be forwarded to the Police Chief for review; if not accepted, the matter would conclude without further action. He then introduced the first case for review, Case No. DR-225083 (Nora Jandres), prior to a Board vote on acceptance of the findings.

The following cases were reviewed by investigator Huff before the board, and all votes were made by the board after discussion of each case.

Motion: Loren Gilbert Smith (D4) moves to not investigate.

Second: Jennifer King (D10) seconds the motion.

Vote: [Yes] D4, D10, D11, **[No]** D1, D2, D3, D6, D7, D8, D13, D14, D15

The Motion fails, and the board has voted for investigator Huff “yes” to investigate.

d. **Action:** Vote on whether the OCPO should conduct an independent investigation into Case No. NI2025-0802

Motion: J. Victor Lander (D8) moves to conduct an independent investigation into the case.

Second: Derric Pegram (D6) seconds the motion.

Vote: [Yes] D2, D3, D6, D8 **[No]** D1, D4, D5, D7, D10, D11, D13, D14, D15

The motion fails, and the office will not be investigating.

iv. Updates on CPOB-approved independent investigation findings and/or policy recommendations submitted to the Chief of Police for consideration

The Chair noted that the Board has received responses from the Police Chief on previously approved independent investigations and that written updates are included in the meeting packet. Investigator Huff and Policy Analyst Sierra Obasuyi presented the first update regarding Investigation NI-2024-1209, which involves a traffic collision complaint alleging officers failed to investigate a reported driver switch. OCPO classified the matter as a failure to investigate and forwarded it to the Chief. The Chief responded that the officers interviewed involved parties, determined the listed driver was operating the vehicle, completed the accident report, issued citations, and towed the vehicle due to no insurance. No further action will be taken, though the response and investigation were forwarded to the officers’ chain of command.

The Board received an update on a second OCPO-approved independent investigation involving Tiffany Zarko Guanajuato, a domestic violence arrest in which the complainant alleged officers failed to obtain her account of events. The Police Chief responded that, based on the totality of information, including reports from hospital nursing staff indicating possible injury, the officers handled the call and arrest appropriately. While noting that photographing potential injuries would have been best practice to enhance reporting, the Chief determined no further action was warranted and forwarded the response to the officers’ chain of command.

Policy Analyst Sierra Obasuyi also reported on a related recommendation to clarify the “guilt or innocence” policy. Following discussions between OCPO and Internal Affairs, it was agreed that no policy changes would be made; instead, both offices will continue to work together to ensure the fair and consistent application of the policy.

In response to a question from **Brandon Friedman (D14)**, OCPO **Director Michele Andre** stated that she was satisfied with the Chief’s responses, emphasizing the value of timely feedback and improved communication compared to past practices, while noting that continued oversight remains important.

v. Monthly Activity Reports

1. November DPD Monthly Arrest by Council District Reports
2. November External Administrative Complaints Reports

Chairman Davidson directed the Board’s attention to the November DPD Monthly Arrest by Council District reports, and the November External Administrative Complaint Reports included in the meeting packet and invited questions or comments.

Jonathan Maples (D2) asked whether previously requested reports, including those raised by speakers regarding ICE collaboration, could be included.

Director Andre advised that, per guidance from the City Attorney, placement of such items on a future agenda would require a request signed by three Board members for discussion and a vote at the next meeting.

Assistant City Attorney Moore clarified that once three members sign a memo, the Chair is required to place the item on the agenda, though the Chair may also do so independently.

Director Andre further noted that information regarding FLOCK camera locations had already been provided in a prior meeting and could be found in the meeting minutes and can be shared again separately if needed.

Chairman Davidson proceeded to the next report with the Senior Outreach Specialist Alma Perez.

Chairman Davidson reminded Board members to submit questions in advance of presentations to help staff and presenters prepare complete and responsive information, noting appreciation for members who regularly do so. He expressed gratitude to the OCPO staff and the Board, shared holiday well wishes, and emphasized the positive momentum heading into 2026, including progress on filling Board vacancies and the welcoming return of **Dr. Lauren Gilbert Smith (D4)**. In response to a question about placing items on the agenda, the Chair explained that members may discuss requests with him directly or submit a memo signed by three Board members. **Jonathan Maples (D3)** thanked DPD representatives for their participation and clarified that Board questions are intended to improve public safety on behalf of the community. The Chair announced the next meeting would be held on January 13, 2026, in the same location.

XII. Public Comment/Open Microphone (3 minutes Per Person)

- a. An open microphone period is provided after the Board has concluded its agenda, at which speakers not heard earlier in the meeting may speak.

Wesley Thomas: Mr. Thomas apologized for an earlier outburst and stated he was unable to sign up to speak earlier in the meeting. He thanked the Board for overseeing the internal investigation, alleging that Internal Affairs attempted to prevent the Board from reviewing the matter and that he had proof of this. He explained that although he filed his complaint on July 15 and Internal Affairs issued a final finding on October 2, he did not receive it because it was allegedly sent to an incorrect email. He stated he was ultimately able to obtain the final finding only after requiring a sergeant to sign the document on November 14, which allowed the issue to be presented to the Board.

John Putnam: Mr. Putnam expressed concern following the FLOCK camera presentation, stating it did not reassure him about privacy protections. He questioned claims that the system does not collect personal data, noting that license plates can be linked to driver identities, and raised concerns about data sharing with state or federal agencies that may work with ICE. He argued that repeated timestamping of license plates constitutes tracking and surveillance, potentially without a judicial warrant, and could allow long-term monitoring of residents' movements. Mr. Putnam emphasized worries about First Amendment activities, such as attending protests or observing court proceedings, being tracked and possibly shared with federal authorities, concluding that such practices undermine community policing and resemble a police state.

Chairman Davidson thanked Mr. Putnam for his comments, agreed that the concerns raised were valid, and stated that the discussion would continue at future meetings. He encouraged continued public engagement on the issue. The Chair then discussed upcoming Board training and a potential retreat, noting that it would likely occur in the spring, after the remaining Board vacancies are filled, to ensure full participation and effective subcommittee assignments. He emphasized the need for advance notice, public meeting requirements, and compliance with open meetings laws. The Chair also noted ongoing efforts to coordinate additional training and demonstrations, with planning to be handled by the Training Committee.

SUBJECT **Dallas Police Department Call-to-Arrest Data**

During the November 10, 2025, Community Police Oversight Board meeting, Board members asked whether a correlation exists between calls for service and resulting arrests. At the subsequent December 9, 2025, meeting, the Board received data regarding 911 emergency response times and priority call classifications.

This memorandum provides additional data, specifically focused on calls for service that resulted in arrests. The information supports the Board's ongoing review of the Dallas Police Department's (DPD) emergency response practices by illustrating how arrest activity aligns with call priorities and response methods across patrol divisions and fiscal years.

Overview of Call Priority Classifications

The data summarizes arrest outcomes associated with the following call priorities:

- **Priority 1:** Emergency calls
- **Priority 2:** Prompt calls
- **Priority 3:** General service calls
- **Priority 4:** Non-critical calls
- **Priority 5:** Virtual Desk Response
- **Priority 7:** Officer-initiated activity

Priority 5 calls are non-emergency reports, typically handled over the phone or online by a 911 Communications Public Service Expeditor (PSE), meaning no officer is dispatched. If arrests result from these calls, they typically occur at a later date rather than at the time of the initial call.

Priority 7 calls consist of self-initiated activities by officers, such as on-view incidents, traffic stops, or other proactive enforcement actions. These are included to provide context for arrests not directly connected to a dispatched call for service.

Executive Summary

Purpose

The Community Police Oversight Board (hereinafter referred to as the CPOB or Board) and the Office of Community Police Oversight (hereinafter referred to as the OCPO or office) provide independent civilian oversight of the Dallas Police Department (DPD). Through complaint review, critical incident monitoring, policy recommendations, and community engagement, they work to strengthen transparency, accountability, and public trust in policing.

FY2025 Key Results

Oversight and Investigations

- **1,276 complaints** received (**16% decrease** from FY2024)
- **191 investigations** completed
- **Six independent investigations** were conducted
- **Nine critical incidents** monitored, including officer-involved shootings and in-custody deaths

Community Feedback

- **447 commendations** received, recognizing professionalism and service by DPD officers

Policy and Transparency

- Completed **12 policy recommendations** to improve complaint handling, communication, and oversight practices
- Launched the **Transparency and Accountability Dashboard**, providing public access to complaints, commendations, and arrest data
- Redesigned the OCPO website to improve accessibility, case tracking, and public information
- Implemented a **Policy Tracker** to publicly report progress on recommendations

OCPO manages community complaints, monitors critical incidents, conducts independent investigations, and provides transparent reporting to the public and City leadership.

Mission

Building trust between the police department and the community through policy, investigation, and open communication to enhance the quality of life in Dallas.

Community Police Oversight Board

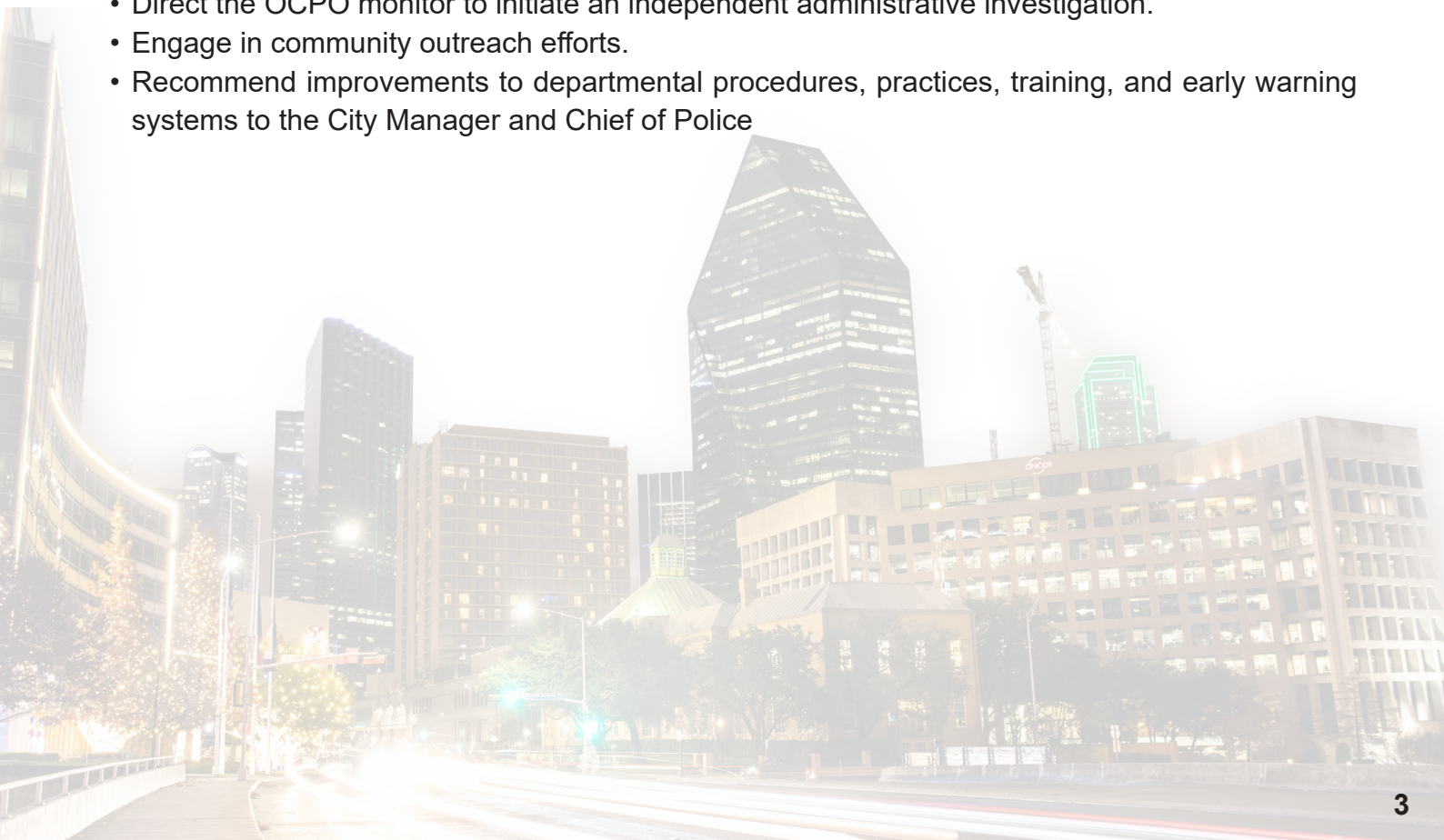
The CPOB is an independent, ordinance-created body that ensures police misconduct complaints are handled fairly, thoroughly, and transparently. Representing each City Council district, the Board provides residents with an accessible avenue to raise concerns and contributes to improved accountability, policy development, and community trust.

Mission and Responsibilities

The CPOB's mission is to build public trust. It ensures that complaints of misconduct against police employees are investigated fairly, thoroughly, and transparently. The CPOB provides Dallas residents with an accessible way to file complaints. Its purpose is to promote accountability and transparency and to foster positive relationships between the community and the police.

Primary Responsibilities include:

- Ensure fair acceptance and processing of external administrative complaints.
- Review facts and evidence of any critical or external administrative complaint against a police officer.
- Direct the OCPO monitor to initiate an independent administrative investigation.
- Engage in community outreach efforts.
- Recommend improvements to departmental procedures, practices, training, and early warning systems to the City Manager and Chief of Police



Membership

The Board consists of 15 members, with representatives from each City Council district. Each city council district is represented by one member. 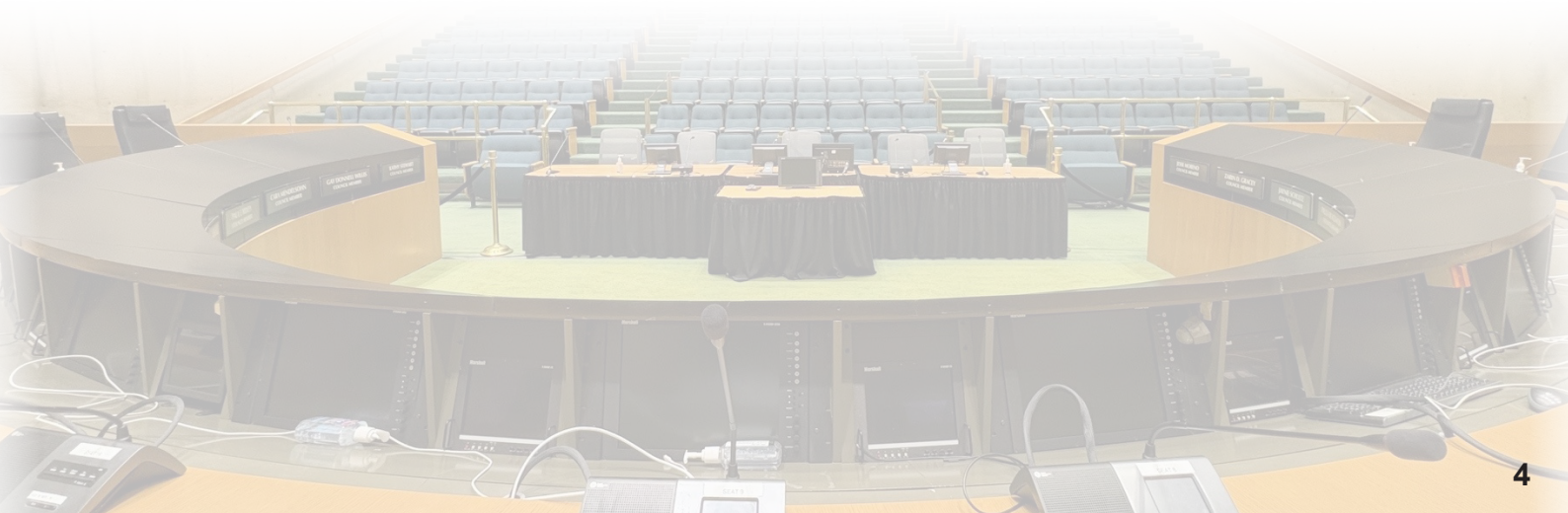

The CPOB has four committees: Policy, Rules, Board Training, and Community Engagement. In FY25, these committees met regularly to support oversight, outreach, and the development of policy recommendations. The Policy Committee met **six** times, Community Engagement met **seven** times, Rules met once, and Board Training met once during FY25. The Board remains committed to enhancing trust between the DPD and the community through thorough investigations, targeted outreach, and informed policy recommendations.



Summary of Highlights of FY 25 Goals and Accomplishments

Goal 1: Recruitment & Retention: Building a Strong Team

Priority: *Assess and fulfill staffing needs of the OCPO.*

- Recruited and on-boarded key personnel, including a Complaint Intake Specialist, Special Investigator, Senior Outreach Specialist, and Communications Advisor to strengthen oversight and community engagement.
- Established clear onboarding protocols and comprehensive training programs covering the IAD complaint process, police-involved shootings, and best practices in civilian oversight.
- Collaborated with Human Resources to reclassify the Mediation Manager position to a Communication Advisor, enhancing OCPO's ability to engage with the public effectively.

Goal 2: Transparency & Accountability: Strengthening Oversight

Priority: *Ensure thorough, fair investigations of all complaints against DPD officers.*

- Developed the Transparency and Accountability Dashboard in partnership with DBI, allowing public access to complaints, commendations, and arrest data.
- Reviewed 529 complaints and completed one independent investigation to uphold integrity and public trust.
- Improved website accessibility and complaint submission processes, ensuring transparency including easier access to oversight resources.

Goal 3: Policy Advocacy: Promoting Fair & Humane Policing

Priority: *Advocate for data-driven policy reforms that ensure the safety and rights of both community members and police officers.*

- Recommended enhancements to the DPD complaint process, including increased transparency on case processing timelines and improved public notifications.
- Advocated for updates to the DPD Arrest Report, now providing data visualization, offense-type breakdowns, and council district trends.
- Conducted ride-a-longs across all seven patrol divisions to gain firsthand insights into policing practices and areas for improvement.
- Recommended updates to IAD's complaint accessibility and transparency systems.

Goal 4: Community Outreach: Enhancing Public Engagement

Priority: *Foster open communication and engagement with the community through outreach efforts and public education.*

- Launched a 24/7 complaint hotline in collaboration with Communications and Customer Experience/ 311 (CCX/311), increasing accessibility for residents to report concerns.
- Attended over 40 community events to educate residents about OCPO's mission and oversight programs.
- Translated complaint and commendation forms into seven languages and distributed them across city facilities to improve accessibility.
- Partnered with CCX/311 to distribute 2,000+ complaint and commendation forms, 1,000 brochures, and 500 flyers in libraries and recreation centers.

Goal 5: Community Engagement: Building Trust and Transparency

Priority: Launch a public communications campaign that strengthens community relationships and builds awareness of the OCPO's mission.

- Launched a Facebook page to engage with residents and promote Community Police Oversight Board (CPOB) meetings.
- Conducted 70 meetings with internal and external stakeholders to gather feedback on improving OCPO operations and community-police relations

Goal 6: Functional Support & Technical Assistance to CPOB

- Addressed technology-related challenges by ensuring CPOB members received city email accounts and laptops for a secure review of complaint materials.
- Standardized formatting and content guidelines for monthly meeting binders, improve efficiency and clarity for board members.
- Finalized and submitted the CPOB annual report to the City Council, marking a key milestone in accountability and transparency efforts



Department Programs

From October 2024 through September 2025, the OCPO carried out its work through four core programs: Complaint Intake, Investigation and Critical Incident Response; Policy Review and Reform; Public Reporting, Transparency and Community Police Oversight Board; and Community Outreach, Engagement and Initiatives.

Complaint Intake, Investigation and Critical Incident Response

Commendations

Community feedback remains an important measure of service quality and professionalism within the DPD. Between October 1, 2024, and September 30, 2025, the Board received 447 commendations recognizing officer professionalism, outstanding performance, dedication to duty, quick response, investigative skills, and kindness (see Figure 1). This represents an average of 37.3 commendations per month and a 0.9% decrease from the prior fiscal year (451 commendations in FY2024). Commendations were submitted to both the office and the IAD.

Figure 1: Commendations by Type (FY 2024 vs. FY2025)

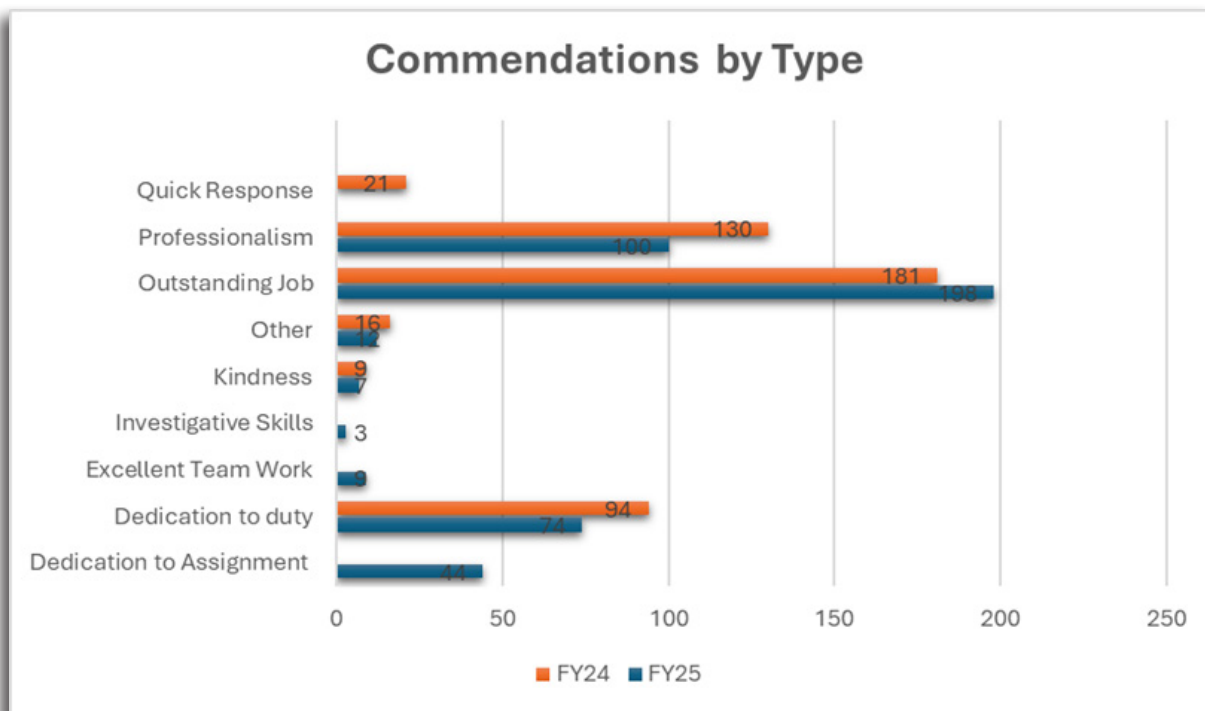
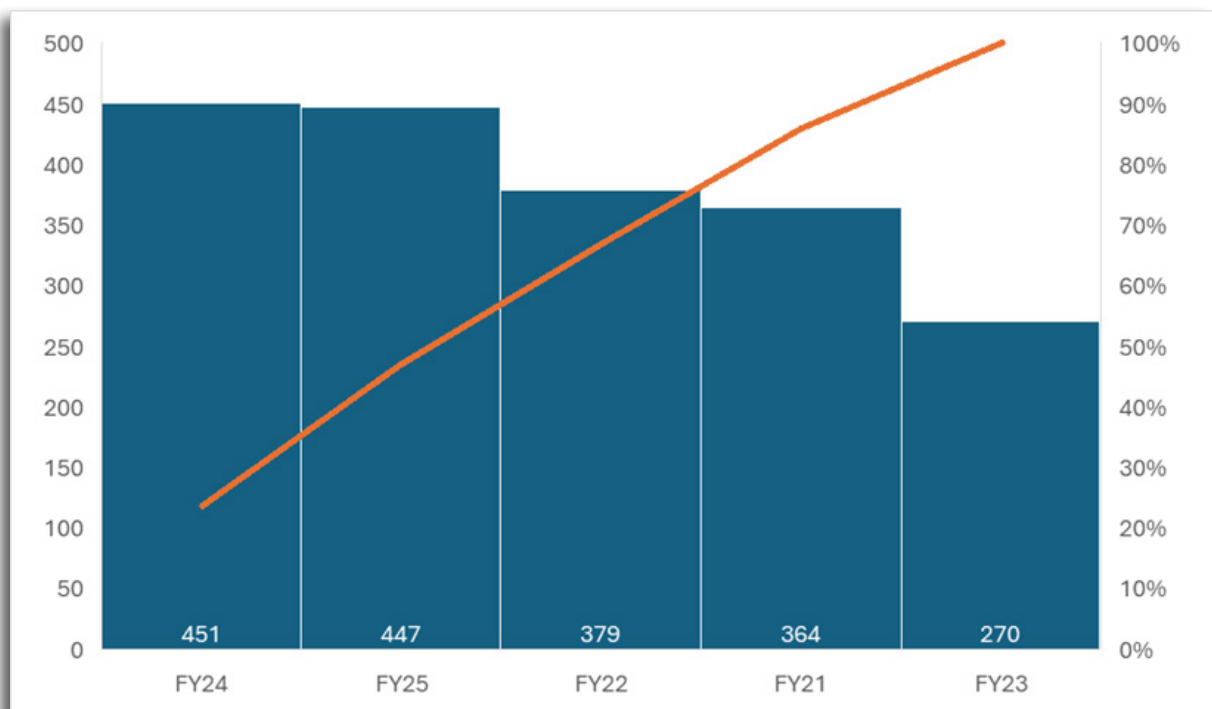


Figure 2: Commendations by Fiscal Year Graph (October 1, 2024 - September 30, 2025)

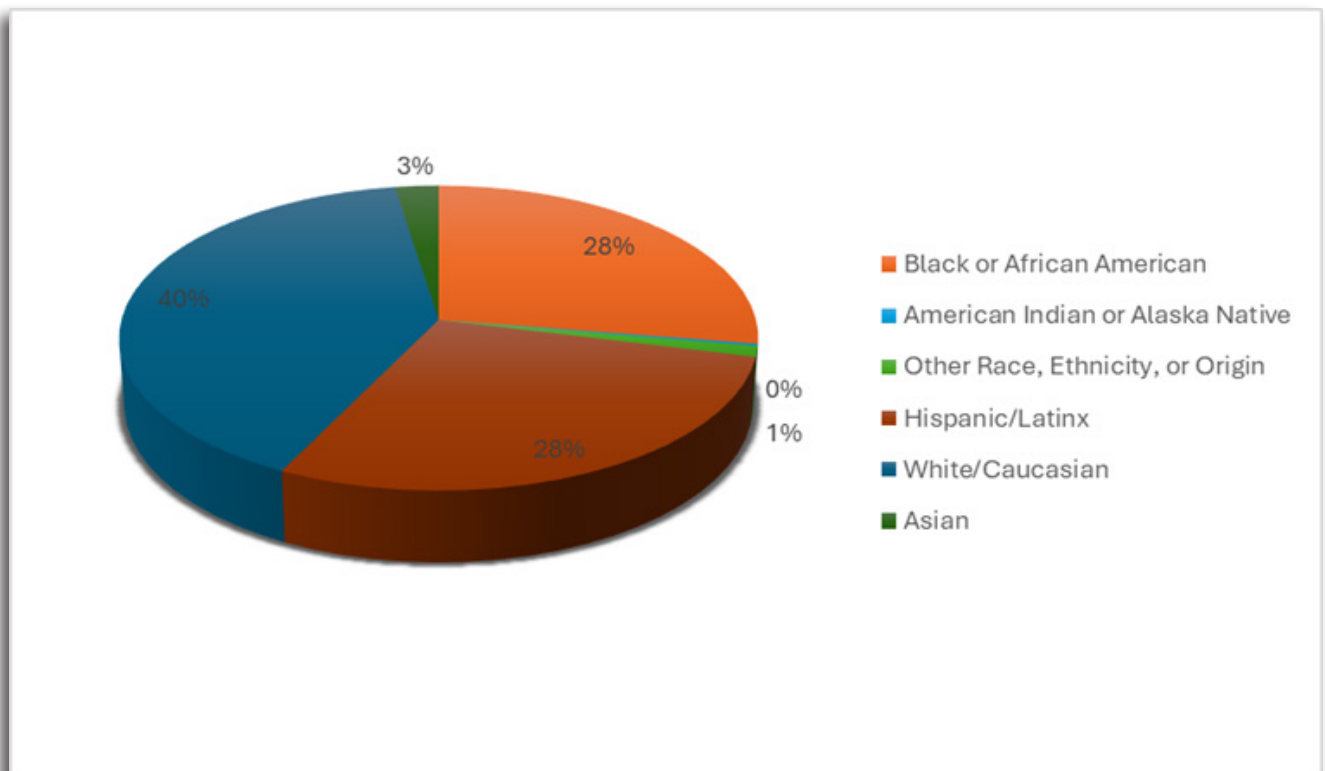
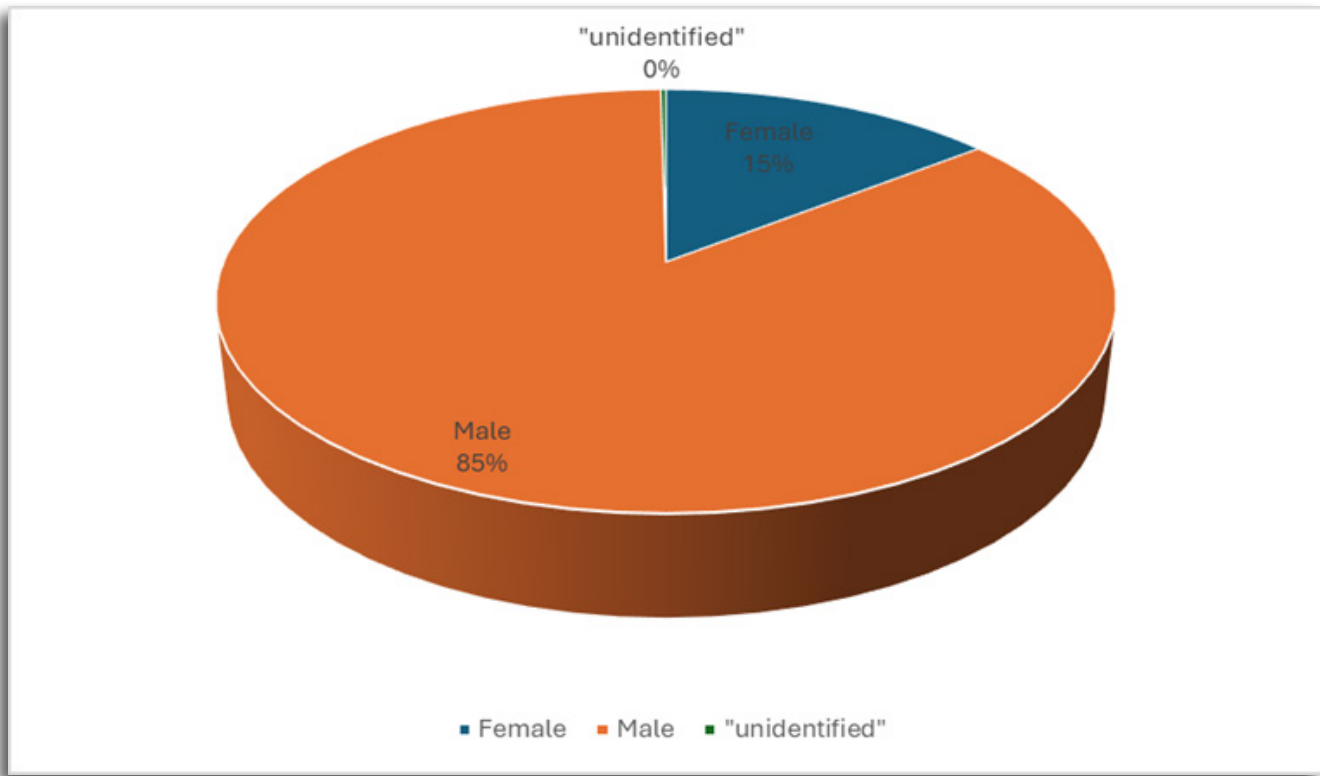


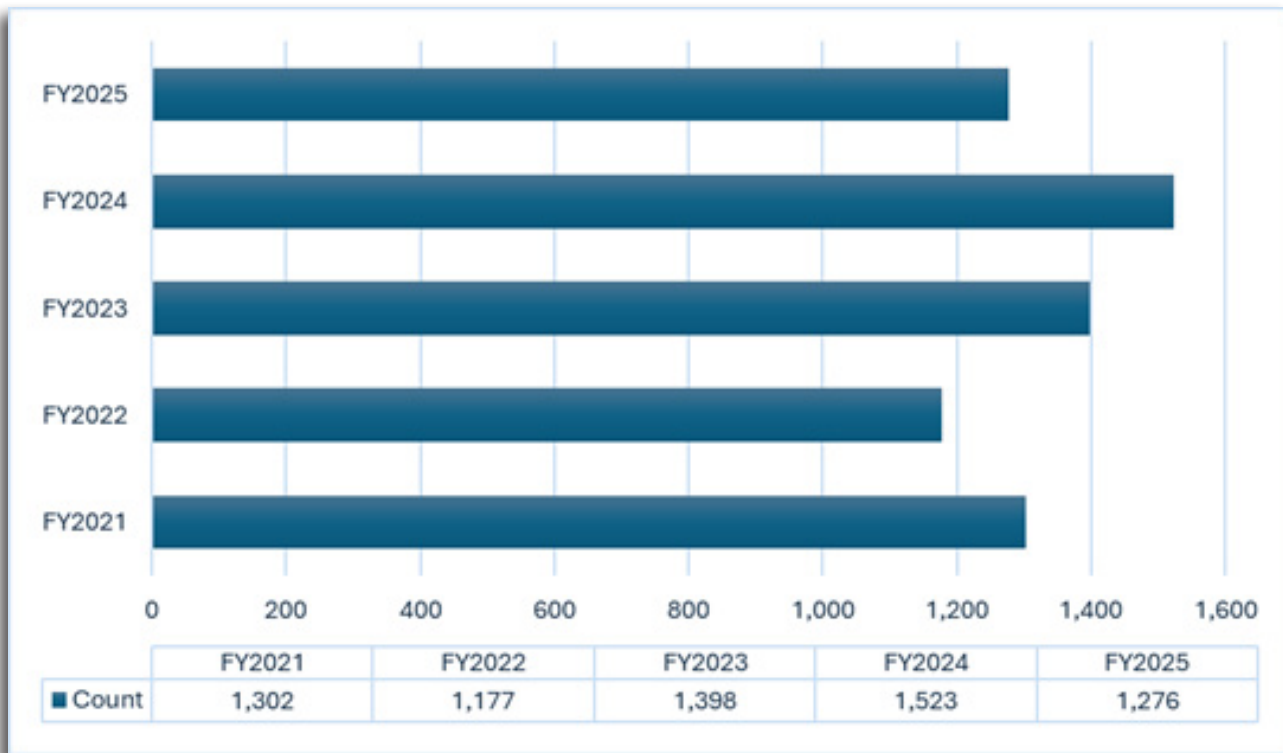
Figure 4: Commendations by Officer Race (October 1, 2024 - September 30, 2025)

Of the officers receiving commendations, 40% identified as White/Caucasian, 28% as Black or African American, 28% as Hispanic/Latinx, 3% as Asian, and 1% as another race/ethnicity (see Figure 3). Additionally, 85% of officers identified as male, 15% as female, and one officer was unidentified (see Figure 4).

Figure 3: Commendations by Officer Race (October 1, 2024 - September 30, 2025)

Complaints

All complaints undergo an initial review by the OCPO and IAD to determine the appropriate investigative route. Of the 1,276 complaints received, 1,105 required no investigation, 138 were referred for divisional investigation, 13 were assigned control numbers, 11 involved use-of-force allegations, and the remainder were categorized as administrative, voided, adverse conduct, or public integrity matters. Fifty-four complaints fell outside the Board’s jurisdiction, and 78 involved non-employees.

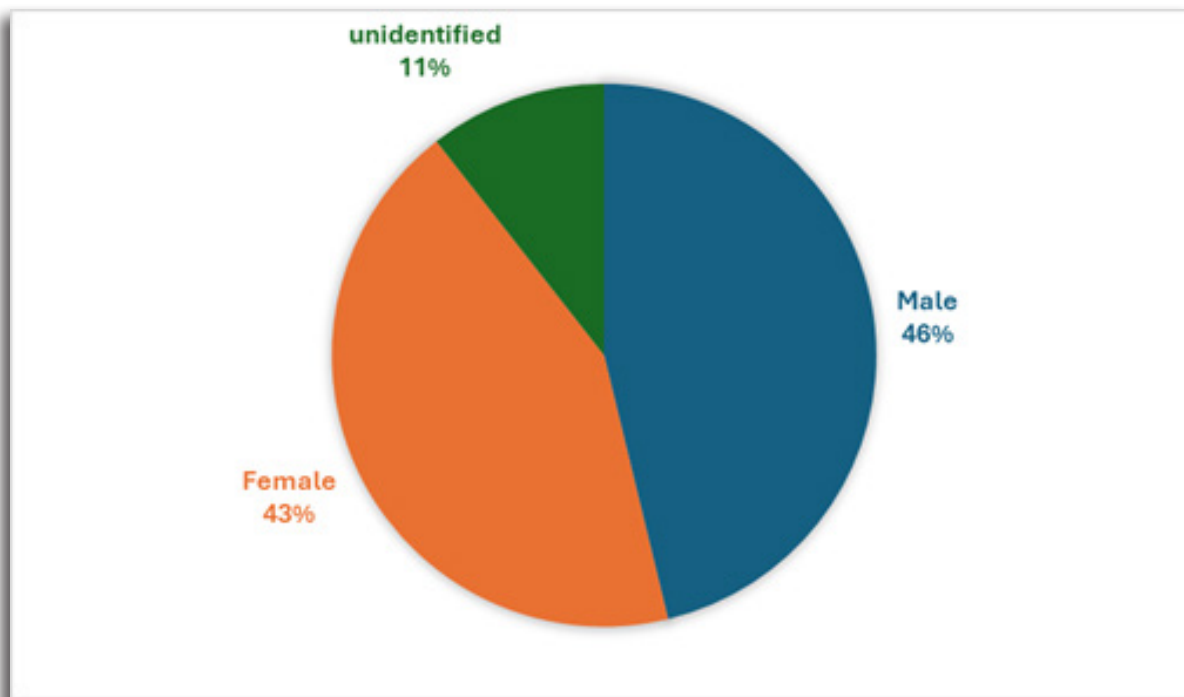
Figure 5: External Administrative Complaints by Fiscal Year (October 1, 2024 - September 30, 2025)

Complainants who file a complaint form with the Office or IAD have the option to include information about their race/ethnicity, gender, and/or age. Among the 1,276 complaints received, 46% of complainants identified as male, 43% as female, and 11% did not disclose a gender identity. There were 617 complainants identified as male, 577 as female, and 141 complainants who did not disclose their gender.

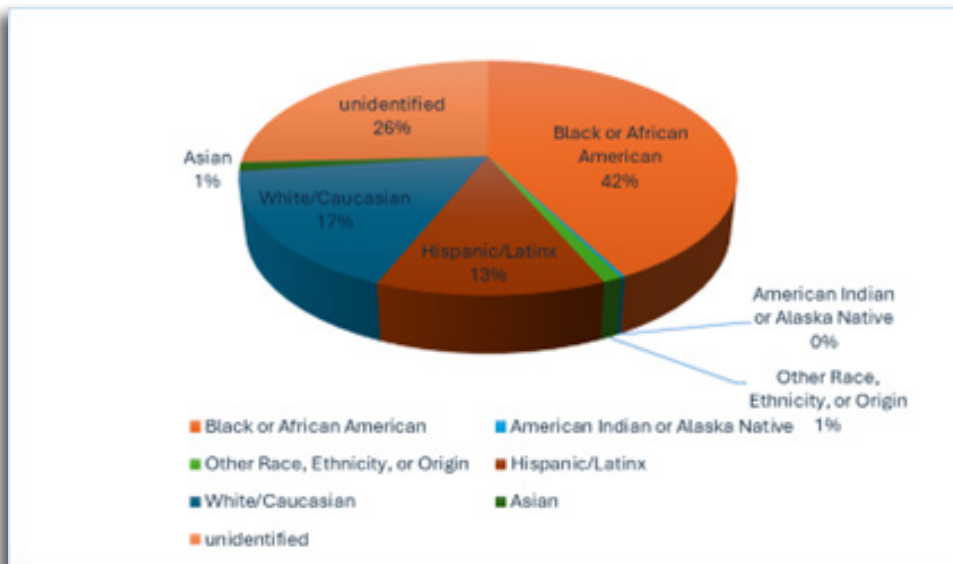
Figure 5: External Administrative Complaints by Fiscal Year (October 1, 2024 - September 30, 2025)



Of the 1,276 new complaints filed, the demographic breakdown is as follows: 42% identified as Black or African American, 26% chose not to disclose their identity, 0% identified as American Indian or Alaska Native, 1% identified as Some Other Race, Ethnicity or Origin, 17% identified as Hispanic/Latinx, fewer than 17% identified as

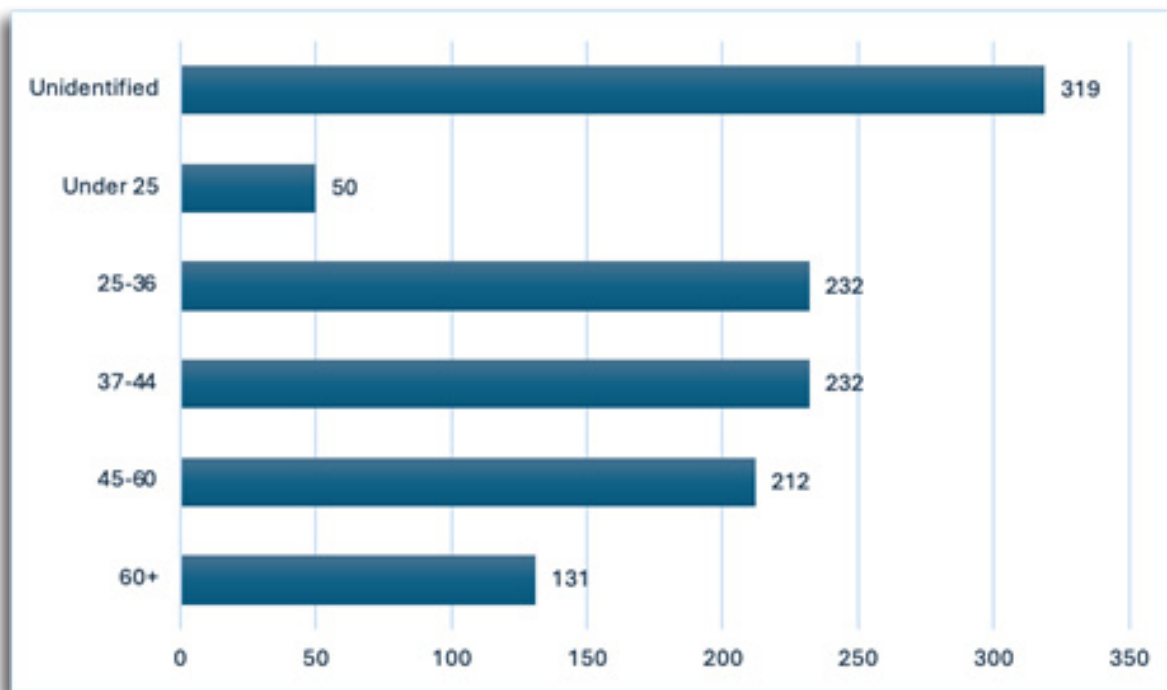
White/Caucasian, and 1% identified as Asian (see Figure 7). Specifically, 553 individuals identified as Black or African American, 3 as American Indian or Alaska Native, 14 as Other Race, Ethnicity or Origin, 338 preferred not to disclose their identity, 164 identified as Hispanic/Latinx, 220 identified as White/Caucasian, and 16 identified as Asian.

In terms of age distribution, 131 complainants were 60 years old and older, 212 were between 45 and 60 years old, 232 were between 37 and 44 years old, 232 were between 25 and 36 years old, and 50 were under 25 years old. Additionally, 479 complainants did not disclose their age.

Complaints Result / Dispositions

Findings were completed for 1,113 complaints. Outcomes included 62 unfounded, 55 sustained, 25 exonerated, 18 not sustained, and 3 voided findings. Corrective actions for sustained cases are determined by the employee's division commander and may range from advice and instruction to termination of employment.

During the reporting period, 191 investigations were completed, consisting of 127 division referrals, 17 administrative inquiries, and 47 control number investigations.

Independent Investigations

Between October 2024 and September 2025, the Board reviewed 19 requests for independent review. Five requests were approved, resulting in six independent investigations conducted by the OCPO. Of these, three agreed with IAD's findings, and three disagreed, ensuring oversight and accountability.

Monitoring Critical Incidents

The OCPO monitored nine critical incidents of significant public interest, including officer-involved shootings and deaths in custody. One critical incident review was completed during the period, and the findings and recommendations were presented to and approved by the Board at its meeting on October 14. Ongoing investigations remain confidential until all criminal and administrative reviews are concluded.



Policy Review and Reform

During Fiscal Year 2025, the OCPO completed 12 policy recommendations aimed at strengthening accountability, enhancing transparency, and fostering trust between the Dallas Police Department (DPD) and the community. For the first time, OCPO established a performance metric to evaluate policy output and better measure progress toward its core oversight responsibilities.

Highlights of Policy Initiatives

1. Transparency in Complaint Processing

OCPO partnered with IAD to establish clearer communication standards and estimated timelines for complaint reviews and investigations. This initiative enhanced transparency, established realistic expectations for complainants, and garnered positive feedback from the community. The recommendation has been fully implemented by DPD.

2. Improving Accessibility and Public Information

OCPO and IAD updated public-facing materials, including the IAD website, complaint and commendation forms, brochures, and notification letters, to simplify the submission process and clearly explain each stage of complaint review. These changes have been successfully implemented by DPD.

3. Departmental Procedures Review

OCPO recommended revisions to DPD General Order 502.00 ("Guilt or Innocence Policy") to ensure all complaints alleging policy or legal violations are reviewed. Following discussions with DPD leadership, the policy remained unchanged, with OCPO and IAD agreeing to continued collaboration to ensure consistent and fair application.

4. Legislative Monitoring and Engagement

During the 89th Texas Legislative Session, OCPO tracked legislation affecting police oversight, engaged with legislators, and provided policy input to support independent civilian oversight.

6. Training Observation for Informed Oversight

OCPO staff observed DPD Reality-Based Training and De-escalation courses to ensure policy recommendations reflect operational practices and best policing standards.

OCPO also launched a [Policy Tracker](#), enabling the public to monitor the status of policy recommendations in real-time.

Public Reporting, Transparency, and Community Police Oversight Board

Transparency and Accountability Dashboard

In collaboration with the DBI, the OCPO developed a public-facing dashboard providing data on complaints, commendations, and DPD arrest activity. The dashboard enables complainants to track the status of their case and shows that complaints are reviewed and resolved in an average of **38 days**, with most investigations completed within **90 days**. The dashboard is fully operational and will be accessible via the OCPO website.

OCPO Website

The OCPO redesigned its website at dal.city/OCPO to improve complaint and commendation submissions and increase public engagement. New features include community feedback tools, meeting information for the CPOB, staff qualifications, detailed complaint processes, an independent review option, and a policy recommendations page with an integrated tracker. These enhancements were implemented and presented to the CPOB in Spring 2025.

Board Training and Engagement

On November 12, 2024, CPOB members participated in a retreat covering Ordinance 31192, board roles and responsibilities, the complaint process, and the Public Integrity Division's officer-involved shooting protocols. Several board members also completed ride-alongs and participated in Reality-Based and de-escalation training at the Dallas Police Academy.

Board Recommendations and Oversight Continuity

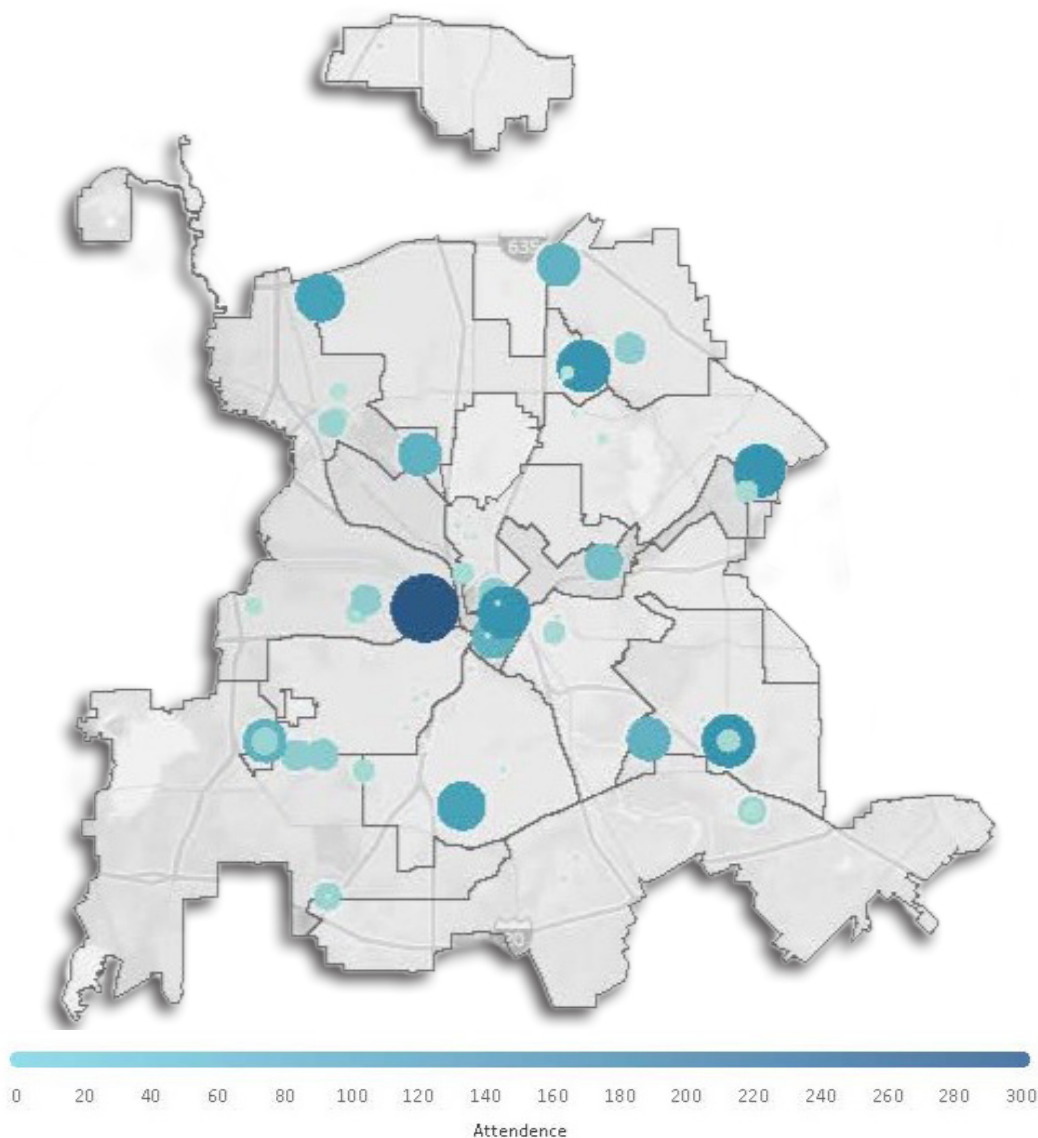
To ensure continuity during critical incidents, the CPOB recommended amendments to Ordinance 31192 allowing the OCPO Director to designate staff coverage in her absence. This change was approved by the City Manager, improving responsiveness during time-sensitive events.

Additionally, the CPOB Policy Committee is developing proposed amendments to [Chapter 37, Article III](#) of the Dallas City Code to strengthen civilian oversight. These recommendations are expected to be presented for Board consideration in FY 2025–2026 before submission to the Board for consideration in FY 2025–2026 and then submitted to the City Manager for the City Council's consideration.



Community Outreach, Engagement & Initiatives

During Fiscal Year 2025, the OCPO continued its commitment to strengthening relationships between Dallas residents and law enforcement through proactive outreach, education, and engagement. OCPO participated in or hosted 94 community events across all 15 City Council districts, demonstrating a consistent citywide presence and direct engagement with residents where they live and work. These outreach efforts included family resource fairs, youth engagement activities, workshops, and collaborative events with community organizations. Events were distributed across districts, with the highest levels of engagement occurring in Districts 2, 6, and 13. Signature activities included community workshops, neighborhood resource events, cultural celebrations, memorials, and public safety awareness initiatives.



To complement in-person outreach, OCPO expanded its digital engagement during the fiscal year. The office launched its official Facebook page in February 2025 and its Instagram page in April 2025 to increase public awareness, share educational content, highlight community partnerships, and promote transparency initiatives.

Collectively, these efforts reflect OCPO's ongoing commitment to accessibility, transparency, and trust-building, ensuring that residents remain informed and engaged in the civilian oversight of law enforcement throughout the City of Dallas.



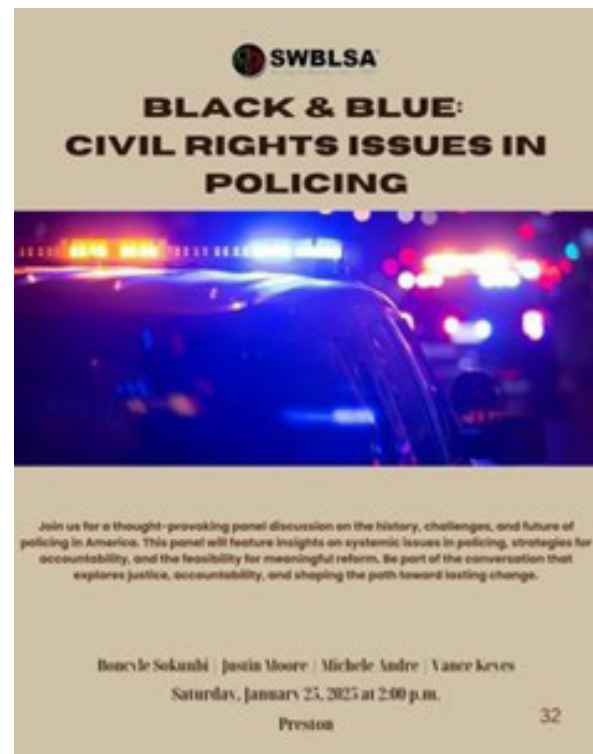

In Fiscal Year 2026, the CPOB and OCPO will continue to:

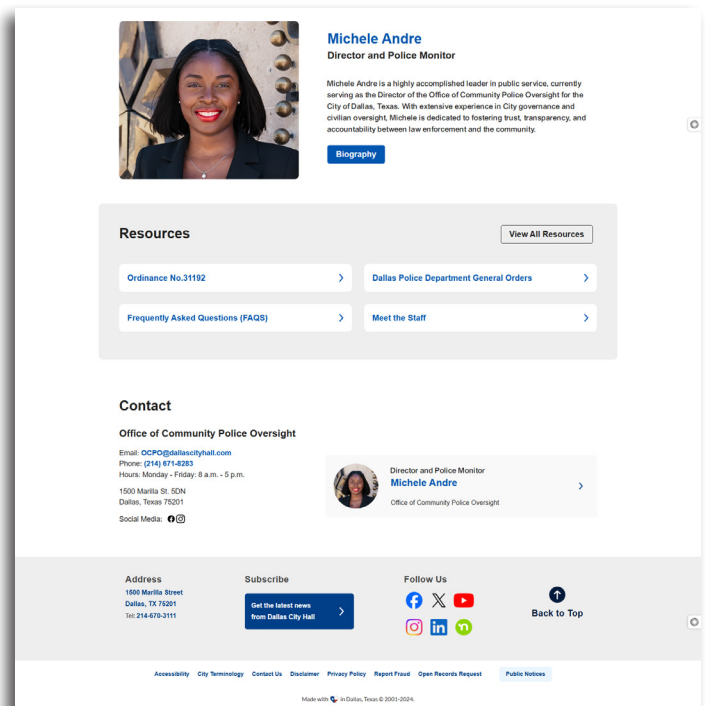
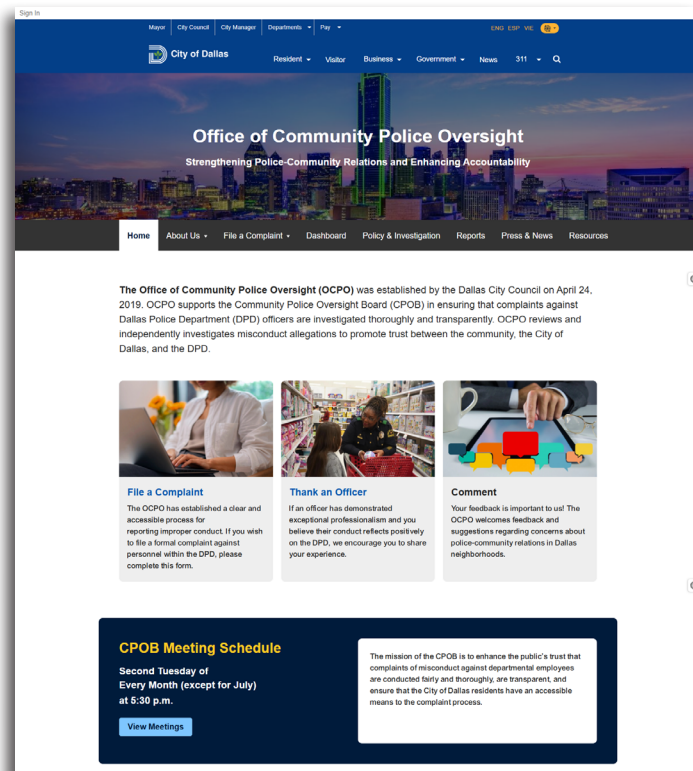
- Conduct thorough and impartial investigations and respond promptly to critical incidents to strengthen public confidence in law enforcement accountability.

Conclusion

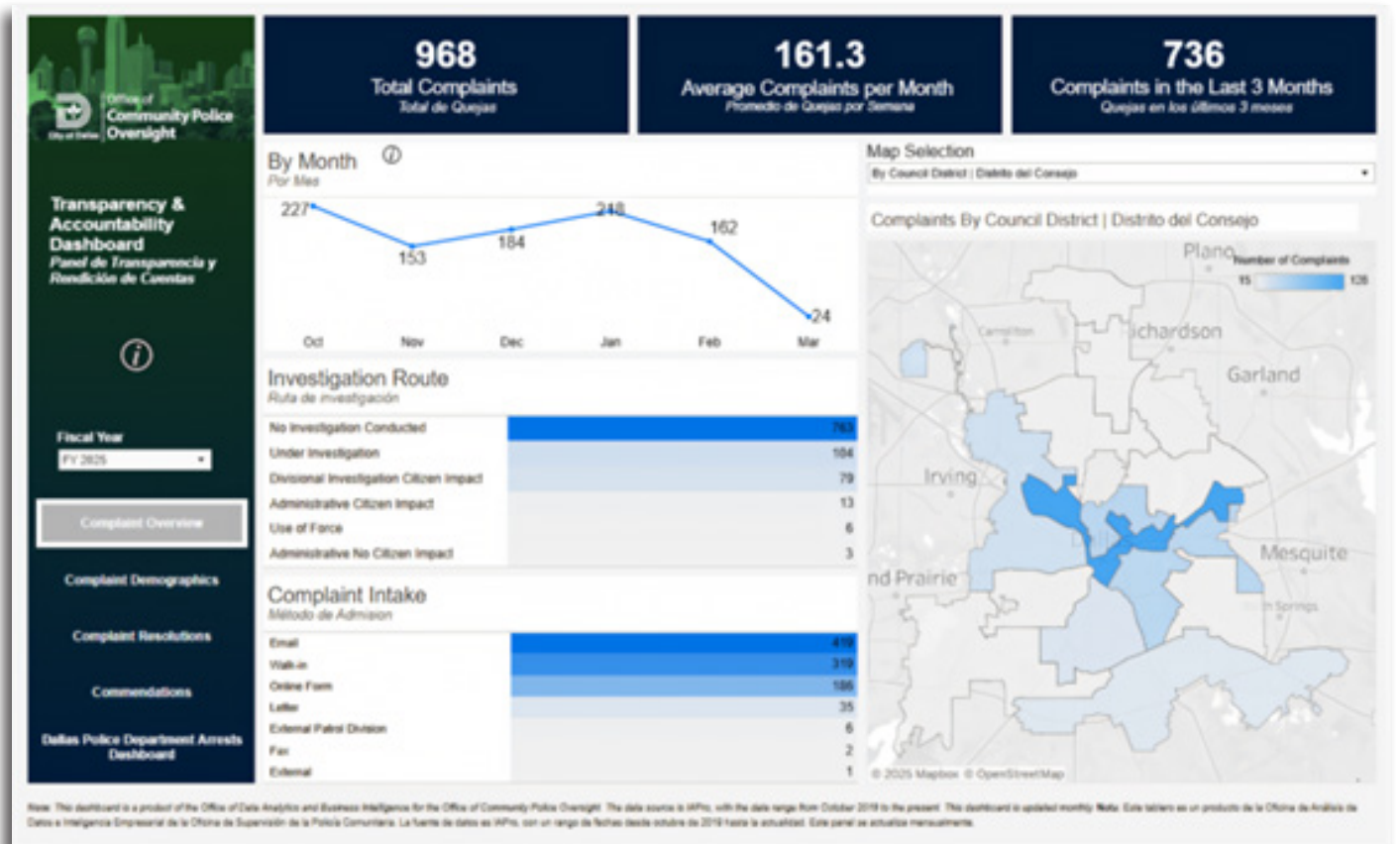

COMPLAINT OUTCOMES

After an investigation, findings are determined based on the evidence gathered:

- **Unfounded** – the acts alleged in the complaint did not occur.
- **Exonerated** – the acts alleged in the complaint occurred but were justified, lawful, and proper.
- **Not Sustained** – there is not sufficient evidence to prove or disprove the allegations.
- **Sustained** – there is a preponderance of evidence in support of the allegations made in the complaint.
- **Complete** – The investigation established the facts of an Administrative Inquiry and determined that no violations of the rules occurred.

DISCIPLINE

The Chief of Police determines disciplinary actions for misconduct. Penalties range from verbal warnings to termination. If OCPO disagrees with the disciplinary action, it can recommend further action to the City Manager.

Know Your Rights: Complaint Rights in Dallas

The Office of Community Police Oversight (OCPO) reviews and independently investigates police misconduct allegations to promote trust between the community, the City of Dallas, and the Dallas Police Department (DPD). If you think you have experienced police misconduct, the OCPO may be able to assist you.

Is the OCPO a part of the DPD?
 No, OCPO is a civilian-led, impartial agency that operates independently from the DPD.

How many days do you have to file a complaint?
 All complaints will be accepted and reviewed when they are received. Personnel complaints will not be investigated if more than 60 days have passed since the alleged incident, unless:

- The complaint involves a criminal violation, in which case the criminal statute of limitations will apply. However, this will not prevent the Dallas Police Department from taking disciplinary action if necessary to maintain the Department's integrity.
- The complainant can demonstrate good cause for not making the complaint within the specified time limit.

If I am in jail, do I have the right to file a complaint?
 Yes, you have that right; it doesn't matter whether you are currently incarcerated. Our investigator or DPD's Internal Affairs Division Detective can visit city or county jails to interview complainants. Or you can mail it into our office.

Can you file a complaint as a third-party complainant?
 No, you cannot file a complaint as a third-party complainant. Allegations from a third party may be considered at the discretion of the Internal Affairs Division. These allegations must be in writing, signed by a person with first-hand knowledge of the incident, and must be brought within the time limit for accepting formal complaints.

Can I file a complaint without knowing the officer's name and badge number?
 Yes, we can identify the officer using DPD records.

What should I do if I experience retaliation for filing a complaint?
 If you suspect retaliation, contact the OCPO immediately. We will refer the matter to DPD's Internal Affairs Division and may open a new investigation if necessary.

What happens after I file a complaint?
 You will receive a letter from our office or Internal Affairs Division notifying you that your complaint has been received.

Staff at OCPO and DPD's Internal Affairs Division will determine if it falls within our jurisdiction. If your complaint is not in our jurisdiction, it is referred to the appropriate agency or entity to investigate the incident. If it is within our jurisdiction, you will receive a letter informing you of our next steps.


Jurisdiction
 The OCPO has the authority to review or investigate critical incidents and complaints of alleged misconduct committed only by members of the DPD. Complaints against members of police departments other than the DPD must be filed with the appropriate local or state authority.

How are complaints resolved?
 Once you file a complaint, the OCPO and the Dallas Police Department's Internal Affairs Division will review the allegations to determine the necessary investigation type:

- **Control Number (CN)** – For allegations that could result in a written reprimand or higher. These complaints are investigated by the Internal Affairs Division.
- **Division Referral (DR)** – For less severe allegations that could result in corrective action of Advice and Instruction, Documented Counseling, or a Supervisors

On behalf of the Community Police Oversight Board (CPOB), I am formally requesting information and briefings on the Dallas Police Department's (DPD) interactions with United States Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE).

Recent videos and photographs circulating publicly show DPD officers present during actions involving ICE. These materials have generated significant community concern regarding the scope of DPD's role in such encounters, the training officers receive to handle immigration-related situations, and whether departmental policies are being consistently followed.

In your October 2025 interview with KERA, you identified transparency, community engagement, and recruitment as your top priorities. The CPOB believes transparency, especially on issues of significant public concern, is essential to building and maintaining community trust.

Accordingly, as Chair of the Community Police Oversight Board, I respectfully submit the following requests for your action and response:

1. Monthly Reporting on ICE-Related Encounters

DPD develops and provides a monthly report detailing calls for service, responses, or encounters involving ICE. This report should include, at a minimum:

- The reason for DPD involvement
- Actions taken by DPD officers
- The outcome of each incident

2. Briefing on Training and Guidance

The CPOB receives a briefing on current and relevant training procedures, including:

- Existing internal or external training for officers related to immigration-related situations or arrests
- Any recent changes to this training, as well as planned updates to the curriculum
- Guidance provided to officers when interacting with federal immigration authorities

On December 20, 2025, at approximately 10:15 a.m., police responded to a shooting in the 9000 block of Markville Drive. Officers found a female victim, who later died at the hospital.

At approximately 11:45 a.m., officers located the suspect in a vehicle at the 18500 block of the LBJ Freeway, near the Town East Mall in Mesquite. During a felony traffic stop, shots were fired, resulting in the suspect's death at the scene. The suspect was identified as Gerald Frank Martin, a 32-year-old. No officers were injured.

The Mesquite Police Department will be investigating the officer-involved shooting.

The Dallas County District Attorney's Office is conducting an independent investigation into the incident. The Office of Community Police Oversight was notified and responded to the scene.

Executive Summary

I. Background

On August 1, 2025, Michael Polsky submitted a complaint to the Dallas Police Department with the following allegations:

1. Officers placed Polsky's child in the care of a stranger.
2. Officers refused Polsky's request to have his child sent to the Children's Hospital for a psychotic episode.
3. Officers refused to tell Polsky where his child was taken to.
4. Officers did not recognize Polsky as the conservator of his child.

II. Investigation Scope

The Office of Community Police Oversight (OCPO) reviewed the initial complaint, which was filed under case number EC2025-0800. The police reports were obtained along with body-worn camera (BWC) footage.

II. Investigation

Dallas Police Internal Affairs Investigation

The Internal Affairs Division forwarded the complaint to the appropriate Patrol Division for investigation. The case was assigned Division Referral number DR2025-084 with Lt. Verhalen as the investigator.

Lt. Verhalen interviewed Michael Polsky regarding his complaint, as well as the sergeant and the five officers involved. He also reviewed Body-Worn Camera footage for each officers and interviewed Agent Polar from Texas Child Protective Services.

Lt. Verhalen concluded that officers completed a thorough investigation. Lt. Verhalen's finding for the allegation of improper or no investigation was **UNFOUNDED** for all the officers involved.

OCPO Independent Review Request

On September 23, 2025, Mr. Polsky sent an Independent Review Request to the Office of Community Police Oversight. Mr. Polsky cited, *"Bias from start, lying to me, violations of family code, malice, contempt for court orders."*

Polsky also included a letter with his request that provided a more detailed description of his original complaint.

Police Report 105826-2025, Reported on 7/25/2025 at 2:01pm

This was a miscellaneous incident report with no offense. The report listed Michael Polsky and his 13-year-old child as witnesses. The report stated that there was an argument between Polsky and his child during which Polsky slapped the child. The officer on scene reached out to Dallas Police Detective Kim #9368, who is a child abuse detective. Detective Kim advised that this act would be considered a form of discipline between a father and child. However, a Child Protective Services referral was created for the incident.

Police Report 105891-2025, Reported on 7/25/2025 at 2:11pm

This was a miscellaneous incident report with no offense. The report listed Michael Polsky as a suspect, Crystal Marchan as a witness, along with Polsky's and Marchan's 13-year-old child as a victim. The report stated that the child reported a physical altercation between herself and Polsky that occurred earlier in the day. The officer did not observe any signs of physical abuse on the child and believed this was a custody issue between the parents.

Police Report 108558-2025, Reported on 7/30/2025 at 4:18pm

This report was titled Interfere with Child Custody – Preliminary Investigation (PC 25.03). This report listed Crystal Marchan as the suspect, the reporting person as Michael Polsky, and their 13-year-old child as the victim. In this report, Polsky stated that Marchan had "supervision only" visitation rights with their child, but their child was currently with Marchan. Polsky advised that he has full custody of their child. Polsky then explained what had happened on July 25, 2025, and what was already documented in the previous police

reports. Polsky showed the officer court documents from August 2023 that listed Polsky as the sole managing conservator and Marchan listed as the possessing conservator.

The officer wrote that there were no articulate facts that would lead to the child being listed as a critical missing. The officer also noted that there was insufficient probable cause to pursue charges against Marchan and that an additional investigation was necessary.

Texas Department of Family and Protective Services

The Texas Department of Family and Protective Services concluded its investigation into allegations of abuse that occurred on 7/25/25. The department's findings regarding allegations of medical neglect and physical abuse were both **RULED OUT**. A finding of ruled out means it was reasonable to conclude that the alleged abuse or neglect did not occur.

Body Worn Camera Video Review

BWC Sgt. Rogers #1

10:43:24 Michael Polsky contacts Sgt. Rogers, who is seated in his patrol vehicle waiting for another officer to respond to the call.

10:44:20 Polsky states that his daughter is confused, and he is tired and probably didn't handle it the best.

10:45:32 Polsky states his daughter did not have permission to leave the residence, and when she tried, it got physical.

10:45:42 Polsky states that his daughter's visitation with her mom is today.

10:52:43 Police contacted the daughter, who is at the neighbor's apartment.

11:07:32 Polsky denies that his daughter made any suicidal statements today. Says it has been a couple of weeks since any mention of suicide.

11:30:42 Officer Sherrill states that they will call a detective to determine if this incident constitutes family violence or parental discipline.

BWC Sgt. Rogers #2

11:46:16 Polsky is placed in handcuffs for family violence.

BWC Sgt. Rogers #3

Nothing to note in this video.

BWC Sgt. Rogers #4

12:12:13 Senior Corporal Salazar explains to the daughter and the neighbor that Polsky will not be arrested today. The neighbor agrees to take the child to her mother.

BWC Sgt. Rogers #5

12:51:15 Polsky says it is against the court order to leave his daughter with her mother.

12:52:00 Sgt. Rogers explains to Polsky that the daughter went with the neighbor who was taking her to her mother. Sgt. Rogers states that they had no information or documents to contradict this. Polsky is advised to send any court orders to the detective assigned to the case.

BWC Corporal Salazar #1

11:19:48 Corporal Salazar arrives on the scene.
11:25:35 Corporal Salazar speaks to the mother (Crystal Marchan) on the phone. Marchan consents to have the child driven to her work by the neighbor.
11:46:16 Polsky is placed in handcuffs and walked to the patrol vehicle.

BWC Corporal Salazar #2

12:12:00 Corporal Salazar discusses the plan with the neighbor and the child for the child to be with her mother.

BWC Corporal Salazar #3

12:22:05 Corporal Salazar tells Polsky he is being released. Polsky states that his daughter needs to be in the hospital. Polsky also states that the court order prevents the daughter from being with the mother.

BWC Corporal Salazar #4

12:29:40 Polsky is uncuffed at the patrol vehicle.
12:30:30 Polsky again states that there is a court order preventing the child from going to be with her mother.
12:30:58 Polsky states that he does not have the court documents with him, but they are upstairs.
12:31:30 Corporal Salazar speaks to the mother on the phone. Only Corporal Salazar can be heard on the phone call.
12:34:12 Corporal Salazar explains to Officer Sherrill that the mother is aware of the court order and is scheduled to have supervised visitation with her daughter tomorrow.

BWC Ofc. Ferguson

11:16:48 Officer Ferguson arrives in the hallway and speaks to Sgt. Rogers.
11:19:20 Officer Ferguson and Officer Tucker wait with Michael Polsky in the hall.
11:33:50 Polsky confirms to Officer Ferguson that the mother does not have any custody of the child and only has supervised visitation, which is scheduled for today.
11:46:16 Polsky is placed in handcuffs and walked downstairs

BWC Ofc. Sherrill

10:52:50 Ofc. Sherrill contacts the 13-year-old child in the neighbor's apartment. The child describes the physical confrontation she had with her father (Polsky).

Summary of Incident from BWC

Sgt. Rogers was the first on scene, and complainant Michael Polsky met him on the street. During this initial interaction, Polsky told Sgt. Rogers that his daughter is confused and that he is tired and probably didn't handle the situation the best. He further stated that his daughter did not have permission to leave the residence, and when she did, it got physical. Polsky added that his daughter has visitation with her mother today. Polsky denied that his daughter had made any suicidal statements today, and it has been a couple of weeks since there was any mention of suicide.

Officer Sherrill contacted the daughter inside a neighbor's (Maria Ragucci) apartment and

took her statement. Officer Sherrill learned of physical contact between the daughter and Polsky prior to police arrival. Officer Sherrill discussed with Sgt. Rogers has the potential for an arrest on Polsky for family violence.

Officer Ferguson arrived on scene and was tasked with waiting with Polsky in the hallway of the apartment complex while the statement was being taken from the daughter inside the neighbor's apartment. Polsky spent this time talking with Officer Ferguson and stated to him that the mother does not have any custody of the child and only has supervised visitation, which is scheduled for today. This information was neither requested nor passed on to either Corporal Salazar, Officer Sherrill (who had been handling the call), or Sgt. Rogers.

Corporal Salazar arrived on the scene, and it was determined that she and her trainee would handle this call. Corporal Salazar spoke to the mother (Crystal Marchan) on the phone, and the mother agreed to have the neighbor drive her daughter to the mother's work to drop her off. The officers on scene made a phone call to a child abused detective to determine if this incident would be family violence or a discipline issue.

While waiting for a call back from the detective, Sgt. Rogers decided that Polsky should be detained in handcuffs. Polsky was handcuffed and placed in a patrol unit. The officers learned from the detective that this incident would be a discipline issue, and an arrest was not warranted. Officers advised the neighbor and the daughter that they could meet up with the mother at her place of employment.

Officers told Polsky he was being released, and he stated that his daughter needed to be in hospital. When Polsky was told that his daughter would be with her mother, Polsky stated that the mother did not have custody. He stated that the mother can only have supervised visits.

Corporal Salazar called Crystal Marchan and confirmed with her that she is only supposed to have supervised visitation, which was scheduled for the following day. Sgt. Rogers explained to Polsky that the neighbor took the daughter to her mother's. Sgt. Rogers advised that they had no knowledge of the court order at the time they released the child. Polsky advised that he can email the officers the court order now or go upstairs and get it. Sgt. Rogers advised Polsky to send the court order to the detective who will be assigned to this case.

Court Order

Polsky provided a court order to the Internal Affairs Division as part of his complaint. This court order dated July 2023, confirmed that Crystal Marchan may be allowed supervised visitation with her daughter.

On page 30 of the July 2023 court order, it stated, "NOTICE TO ANY PEACE OFFICER OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: YOU MAY USE REASONABLE EFFORTS TO ENFORCE THE TERMS OF CHILD CUSTODY SPECIFIED IN THIS ORDER."

Complainant Michael Polsky Interview

Investigator Huff interviewed Michael Polsky on December 11, 2025. Polsky stated that he attempted to show the officers the court order, but they would not allow him to get it. He asked them to escort him to his apartment so he could show the court order, but they did not allow him to move. Polsky also stated the reason he called the police that day was to get his daughter into a hospital for being suicidal. Polsky said when police arrived that day, he told them about his daughter being suicidal, but they did not do anything.

III. Findings

The OCPO reached its conclusions after thoroughly reviewing all available evidence, including video footage, factual records, statements from the involved parties, and official reports. The OCPO also carefully considered the language of all relevant policies and laws to ensure a well-reasoned and informed outcome.

1. Officers placed Polsky's child in the care of a stranger.

When responding to the call, officers located the child in the neighbor's (Maria Ragucci) apartment. Officers reached out to the child's mother, and the mother advised it was okay for the neighbor to give the child a ride to the mother's work location. The finding of this allegation is **EXONERATED** - the investigation revealed the acts did occur but were justified, lawful, and proper.

2. Officers refused to have the child sent to a hospital for a psychotic episode.

In Polsky's statement to Investigator Huff, he mentioned that he told police when they arrived on the scene that his daughter had been suicidal. BWC showed Polsky telling the police that his daughter had made suicidal statements in the past but had not made any suicidal statements today. Polsky told officers when they arrived on the scene that his daughter was not suicidal. No additional information was received during the course of this investigation that would necessitate the child's mandatory hospitalization. The finding for this allegation is **UNFOUNDED**.

3. Officers refused to tell Polsky where his child was taken to.

Officers did inform Polsky that the child had been released from her mother. The finding for this allegation is **UNFOUNDED**.

4. Officers did not recognize Polsky as the conservator of his child.

When Polsky told officers that he had a court order and offered to go get it, his child had already been released from the mother. Officers told Polsky to follow up with the detective assigned to the case and show the court documents to that detective. A review of the court order revealed that the wording states any officer in the State of Texas **may** (instead of shall) use reasonable efforts to enforce the child custody order. The finding of this allegation is **UNFOUNDED**.

The above specific allegations that Polsky made all fall under the **Code of Conduct, Section 5.3**; *Elements will investigate those incidents assigned or which come to their attention to the fullest extent within their assigned responsibilities.*

The finding for this policy violation allegation is **UNFOUNDED**.

IV. Recommendation(s) for Policy and/or Discipline (if any)

The OCPO does not have any policy recommendations at this time.

V. Conclusion

The OCPO reviewed all available evidence, including video footage, established facts, statements from involved parties, and official reports. Each conclusion was based on a careful application of the language in all relevant policies and laws. The OCPO found no violations of departmental policies or procedures related to the original complaint.

Executive Summary

I. Background

On August 17, 2025, Senrick Wilkerson filed a complaint with the Dallas Police Department, making the following allegations:

- Wilkerson alleged he was falsely accused of rape.
- Wilkerson stated that false arrest warrants were issued and dismissed on November 29, 2010.
- He further alleged that the Dallas Police Department did not exercise due diligence when arresting him on these warrants.
- Wilkerson also claimed he was forced into a fraudulent trial and wrongfully convicted on sex charges.

II. Investigation Scope

The OCPO reviewed the complaint under case number EC2025-0868. Internal Affairs Division declined to investigate, closing it as a duplicate under case number NI2025-0757. It should be noted that both officers involved in this complaint are no longer employed by the Dallas Police Department.

IV. Investigation

Dallas Police Internal Affairs Investigation

The Internal Affairs Division sent a letter to Wilkerson dated October 1, 2025, advising that no investigation would be conducted due to a determination that there was no violation of departmental policies or procedures. The letter went on to note that this was also a duplicate complaint that had been submitted on December 26, 2023, and had not been investigated for the same reasons.

Internal Affairs Division records shows that Wilkerson filed 14 separate complaints regarding the November 29, 2010, incident:

OCPO Independent Review Request

On October 9, 2025, Wilkerson submitted an Independent Review Request to the OCPO, alleging his conviction was based on falsified government documents by the Dallas Police Department. On November 10, 2025, the Community Police Oversight Board voted to conduct an independent investigation into his complaint.

Police Report 20080237338

The police report from the Dallas Police Records Management System is limited, as it was converted from an older system. Dated July 31, 2008, the report is over 17 years old and contains only a summary stating that the listed suspects caused a child under 17, to commit prostitution.

Interview with Senrick Wilkerson

On December 1, 2025, Investigator Huff interviewed Senrick Wilkerson by phone. Wilkerson advised that the rape allegations against him were manufactured by the police department. When asked about evidence to support his claims, Wilkerson said he is the evidence since he knows he never committed rape. Wilkerson claims the police, the prosecutor, the judge, and his defense attorney were all involved in fabricating the false charges against him. When asked about a motive, Wilkerson advised that he had been in a fight with Officer McMurray a few years earlier, where he had thrown the officer down to the ground. Wilkerson believes that is the reason Officer McMurray manufactured charges against him. Wilkerson also believes the entire trial was fraudulent since he was never arrested on the rape charges.

Petition for Writ of Habeas Corpus

An internet search for court documents revealed a petition for a writ of habeas corpus, dated January 23, 2015, filed by Wilkerson. The writ was filed in the District Court for the Northern District of Texas, Dallas Division. The Court addresses Wilkerson's claim that there were defective arrest warrants, and he was never arrested or arraigned on the charges. The Court explained that in October 2008, Wilkerson was charged with compelling prostitution of a child, and he was free on a \$25,000 bond for those charges for over two years. On November 22, 2010, Wilkerson was indicted for sexual performance of a child and sexual assault of a child. Since the new charges stemmed from the same course of events as the 2008 charge, they were consolidated. The Court stated that Wilkerson does not have a constitutional right to be arrested. Wilkerson provided no legal reason why the State could not add new charges after his initial indictment. The Court goes on to explain that even if there was a procedural defect due to the lack of arrest, Wilkerson would not be entitled to habeas corpus relief because an illegal arrest or detention does not void a subsequent conviction (*Gerstein v. Pugh*, 420 U.S. 103, 119 (1975)).

The Court also addressed Wilkerson's claims of police and prosecutorial misconduct with a summary conclusion, "*Upon review, the Court finds that these contentions, also conclusory, lack merit as well.*"

V. Findings

Wilkerson's primary allegation is that he was never arrested for sexual assault of a child, and he claims this makes the charges fraudulent. He was, his own admission, convicted in a jury trial for sexual crimes against a child. The OCPO reviewed the allegations for possible misconduct by Sgt. Fassett and Corporal McMurray found none. There is no requirement that a defendant be arrested on all charges before trial, as prosecutors may

add or remove charges at their discretion. Any changes to charges are determined by the prosecutor, not the individual officers. Therefore, the OCPO finds Wilkerson's allegations against Sgt. Fassett and Corporal McMurray case was **UNFOUNDED**.

VI. Recommendation(s) for Policy and/or Discipline (if any)

The OCPO has no policy recommendations at this time.

VII. Conclusion

The OCPO reached its conclusions after thoroughly reviewing all available evidence and considering the relevant policies and laws to ensure a well-reasoned and informed outcome.

Based on Wilkerson's interview, his allegations against the Dallas Police Department are criminal in nature. Wilkerson is alleging that Senior Corporal McMurray and Sgt. Fassett willfully conspired to produce fraudulent charges against him. Wilkerson further alleged that not only are the police involved in this conspiracy, but also the prosecutor, the judge, and his defense attorney. Wilkerson was unable to produce any specific facts to support this claim, except by stating his innocence and the fact that he was never physically arrested for the crimes.

General Order 502.00(C)(2) specifically addresses the complaint of innocence by stating: *"Complaints relative to difference of opinion between a citizen and an arresting police officer regarding the guilt or innocence of that citizen will not be investigated but will be properly disposed of within the judicial system."*

In this case, the judicial system examined allegations of police and prosecutorial misconduct, as well as claims of not being arrested or arraigned. The Court did not agree with Wilkerson's position.

Based on Dallas Police Department policy, the OCPO concluded that the Internal Affairs Division handled this complaint appropriately by referring the allegations to the judicial system.

Executive Summary

I. Background

On July 15, 2025, Wesley Thomas submitted a complaint to the Dallas Police Department and made the following allegations:

- Police responded to a civil matter at Mr. Thomas' residence. After determining that no crime had been committed, Mr. Thomas instructed Sgt. Ponce to leave his property. Mr. Thomas alleges that Sgt. Ponce remained on the property for 30 minutes after being told to leave.
- Sgt. Ponce used profane language when leaving the property.

II. Investigation Scope

The Office of Community Police Oversight (OCPO) reviewed the initial complaint, case number EC2025-0766 and obtained the police report and body-worn camera (BWC) footage. The Internal Affairs Division referred the complaint to the appropriate Patrol Division for investigation under case number DR2025-091.

III. Investigation Findings

Finding

1. Sergeant Daniel Ponce #10459

- **Allegation (I):** COC 4.2 – No employee will commit a criminal act. Unfounded.
- **Allegation (II):** COC 4.15 – No employee shall use profane language. Sustained.

II. Investigation

Dallas Police Internal Affairs Investigation

The Internal Affairs Division did not investigate this complaint. Instead, the complaint was forwarded to the relevant Patrol Division for investigation. The complaint was assigned Division Referral number DR2025-091. Lt. Sanderlin was assigned to this investigation.

Lt. Sanderlin reported that officers responded to a disturbance involving Mr. Thomas and a firearm. Officers were at the property for approximately 15 minutes, but they remained outside of his driveway gate and fence line.

The investigation revealed that when Mr. Thomas was yelling profanities at Sgt. Ponce to get off his property, Sgt. Ponce responded with, "That's what I'm fucking doing." Mr. Thomas yelled something else at Sgt. Ponce, who responded with, "No shit."

Lt. Sanderlin concluded that the profanity allegation was **Exonerated** – the acts alleged in the complaint occurred but were justified, lawful, and proper. Lt. Sanderlin wrote that Sgt. Ponce's response to the hostile language was justified, but he also discussed it with Sgt. Ponce other verbal tactics that can prove equally effective.

There was no finding listed for the trespass allegation.

OCPO Independent Review Request

On November 14, 2025, Mr. Thomas submitted a request for an independent review of his complaint. If a complainant is dissatisfied with the findings of the Internal Affairs investigation, they may request an independent review by the OCPO.

In his review request, Thomas complained that the following issues were never investigated by Internal Affairs:

1. Officers declared the incident to be a civil matter but stayed for over 30 minutes.
2. Officers stood and parked a vehicle inside his property line.
3. Officers checked his name for warrants after they were aware it was a civil matter.
4. Officers only documented the other party and ignored his statements.
5. Officers gave improper legal advice to the other party.
6. Supervisor misconduct was ignored. (The supervisor allowed officers to remain on his property, run his name, and escalate instead of disengaging).
7. Internal Affairs failed to address trespassing, unreasonable seizure, warrant checks without cause, biased enforcement, civil-rights violations, supervisory misconduct, and inaccurate reporting.

Incident Report 25-1239971

A caller reported that she was at the location (7200 block S. Lancaster Rd) to pick up her child when the child's father (Wesley Thomas) pulled a gun on her. Police responded and learned that there was no custody agreement between the two parties. The police learned after they arrived that Thomas did not point the weapon at the caller. The police attempted to resolve the issue between the two parties; however, Thomas was unwilling to cooperate.

Body Worn Camera Video Review

Sgt. Ponce 7/13/25

18:16:40 Sgt. Ponce parks on the dirt driveway at Thomas' residence.

18:17:01 Sgt. Ponce walks up to the chain link gate at the driveway. Officer Kirkwood and Officer Riddle are also at the gate. Thomas is finishing up his conversation with the officers and can be heard saying, "My daughter is up at the correct time at five O'clock. We don't have a court order. Okay. She decided she wanted to stay up till seven O'clock with her boyfriend. I told her, fine, my daughter can stay now. She is over here trying to pick her up. No, okay, that's fine. That's the end of it. That's fine. That I'm, I'm done with it. That's the end of it."

18:17:28 Thomas states to the officers, "At this time, I'm trespassing you from my property. You're not here for a criminal reason. Get the fuck off my property".

18:18:20 Officer Kirkwood and Officer Riddle walk towards the street, and Sgt. Ponce walks towards his patrol car. Thomas states, "I asked you to leave my property". Sgt. Ponce states, "I heard you".

18:18:40 Sgt. Ponce walks back to the gate to converse with Thomas. Thomas asks what the reason is for them being on his property. Sgt. Ponce explains the 911 call to Thomas.

18:20:33 Sgt. Ponce walks to the street where the caller is located.

18:29:50 Sgt. Ponce walks up the driveway towards his patrol car.

18:29:57 Sgt. Ponce yells to Thomas, "Alright, sir, you have a good day". Thomas replies, "You too, now get off my property". Sgt. Ponce states, "Well, that's what I'm fucking doing". Thomas yells something that is unintelligible. Sgt. Ponce states, "No shit, you saw me walking towards my car".

Summary of Incident (Based on Report and BWC)

Officer Kirkwood and her partner, Officer Riddle, responded to a call about a child custody situation in which the child's father pulled a gun on the caller. Officer Kirkwood arrived at 6:15 pm and parked on the street in front of 7204 S Lancaster. The officers spoke to the caller, who was in her vehicle, parked in front of the residence. The caller advised that she was here to pick up her daughter from the father but told the officers that there was no court order in place. There is no mention of a gun at this time.

Officer Kirkwood and Officer Riddle walked up the dirt driveway until they reached a chain link fence about a third of the way up the property from the street. There were signs posted on the gate stating, "Private property, No Trespassing, Keep out". There was a gap of about 4 feet between the two halves of the gate, which was held together by a large chain.

Officer Kirkwood and Officer Riddle did not go past the gate. They spoke with Wesley Thomas, who was on the other side of the gate. At this time, Sgt. Ponce pulled up and parked his patrol vehicle on the dirt portion of the driveway near Officers Kirkwood and Riddle. Thomas told the officers, in essence, that the mother did not pick up the child at the correct time, so he was not going to let her have the child now.

Sgt. Ponce asked the officers to determine if a gun had been used during the incident, as it had been mentioned in the call. Thomas then told the officers to leave his property. Officers Kirkwood and Riddle walked back to the street to contact the caller again. Sgt. Ponce stayed behind to answer a question from Thomas about why the officers were there.

Sgt. Ponce walked out to the street where the officers were, leaving his vehicle parked on the dirt driveway. The officers learned from the caller that Thomas did have a gun, but that no crime was committed. Sgt. Ponce walked up the driveway to his patrol vehicle, and just before getting in the vehicle, he had an exchange of words with Thomas. Sgt. Ponce then drove away. The officers did not write a report on this incident; however, it was documented in the call log.

Complainant Wesley Thomas Interview

On December 22, 2025, at 1350 hours, Investigator Huff spoke to Wesley Thomas by phone. Thomas reiterated his complaint regarding the trespassing and the foul language. Thomas advised that he emailed the plot plan for his property to show the property lines. Thomas wanted to add more allegations to the complaint, such as officers giving improper legal advice and violating his civil rights by running his name for warrants. Thomas was advised he would need to make a separate complaint for those allegations; however, Thomas was informed that if OCPO identifies policy violations during this investigation, they would be noted in this report. Thomas also complained about the Internal Affairs Division sending his closure letter to the wrong email address. Thomas acknowledge that he was able to obtain a copy of the letter when he visited Internal Affairs in person.

Sergeant Ponce Interview

On December 22, 2025, at 1315 hours, Investigator Huff spoke to Sgt. Ponce by phone. In regard to the trespassing allegation, Sgt. Ponce advised that the call he was on was in reference to a subject with a gun. Sgt. Ponce said he parked in front of a fence with “No Trespassing” signs but never went beyond the fence. Sgt. Ponce did not see any trespassing signs on the dirt lot where he was parked.

In regard to the foul language allegation. Sgt. Ponce admitted to saying something similar to “That’s what I’m fucking doing”. Sgt. Ponce said he used foul language to show the subject that he was serious. Sgt. Ponce did not want to appear weak in light of the possibility that the subject might have a gun. Sgt. Ponce thought that he had already been found to be sustained on the profanity allegation by the department.

III. Findings

The OCPO reached its conclusions after thoroughly reviewing all available evidence, including video footage, factual records, statements from the involved parties, and official reports. In making its decision, the OCPO carefully considered the precise language of all relevant policies and laws to ensure a well-reasoned and informed outcome.

1. Code of Conduct, Section 4.2 – No employee shall be convicted of, nor commit, any act or omission which is defined as a criminal act.

It was alleged that Sgt. Ponce trespassed on Wesley Thomas’ property.

Texas Penal Code section 30.05 defines criminal trespass as: *(a) A person commits an offense if the person enters or remains on or in property of another, including residential land, agricultural land, a recreational vehicle park, a building, a general residential operation operating as a residential treatment center, or an aircraft or*

other vehicle, without effective consent and the person:

(1) had notice that the entry was forbidden; or

(2) received notice to depart but failed to do so.

(b) For purposes of this section:

(1) "Entry" means the intrusion of the entire body.

(2) "Notice" means:

(A) oral or written communication by the owner or someone with apparent authority to act for the owner;

(B) fencing or other enclosure obviously designed to exclude intruders or to contain livestock;

(C) a sign or signs posted on the property or at the entrance to the building, reasonably likely to come to the attention of intruders, indicating that entry is forbidden;

Sgt. Ponce responded to Thomas' residence to investigate a crime involving a firearm. Sgt. Ponce pulled his patrol vehicle onto the unfenced portion of a dirt lot and stopped near where two officers were standing. There were no signs posted at this dirt lot indicating that entry was forbidden. Parking at this location would have given Sgt. Ponce had the best tactical advantage, given the type of call and the location of the other officers. Sgt. Ponce parked in front of a fence that had "No Trespassing" signs on it. The officers never crossed this fence line.

When Thomas told Sgt. Ponce to leave, there was no discussion clarifying the property boundaries. Sgt. Ponce was on the dirt lot in his capacity as a Dallas police officer investigating a firearm-related incident.

Sgt. Ponce was parked on the property for approximately 14 minutes.

Based on the totality of these circumstances, Sgt. Ponce did not violate the criminal trespass penal code section and therefore did not violate the Code of Conduct, Section 4.2. The finding for this allegation is: **UNFOUNDED** – The acts alleged in the complaint did not occur.

2. Code of Conduct, Section 4.15 – No employee shall use indecent or profane language in the performance of official duties or in the presence of the public.

During this incident, Thomas told Sgt. Ponce to get off his property. Sgt. Ponce responded with, "Well, that's what I'm fucking doing," and "No shit, you saw me walking towards my car". These statements by Sgt. Ponce were recorded with his BWC. Based on the above statements, Sgt. Ponce did violate Section 4.15 of the Code of Conduct. The finding for this allegation is:

SUSTAINED - There is a preponderance of evidence in support of the allegations made in the complaint.

IV. Recommendation(s) for Policy and/or Discipline (if any)

The OCPO does not have any policy recommendations at this time.

V. Conclusion

The OCPO reviewed all available evidence, including video footage, established facts, statements from involved parties, and official reports. Each conclusion is based on a careful application of the specific language in all relevant policies and laws.

The OCPO acknowledges that, although the Division Referral showed that Sgt. Ponce was Exonerated for the foul language; Lt. Sanderlin noted that he discussed this with Sgt. Ponce that other verbal tactics can be proved just as effective. Therefore, we do not have any further recommendations or actions regarding this case at this time.

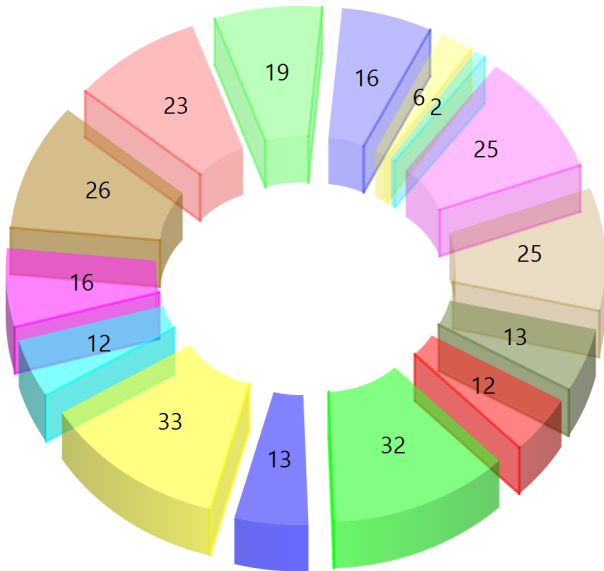

SUBJECT **Complaints Received from December 1, 2025, to December 31, 2025**

This memorandum provides a summary of complaints received and resolved by OCPO in November 2025. From **December 1 to December 31, 2025**, the **Office of Community Police Oversight (OCPO)** received a total of **93 complaints**. Each complaint undergoes an initial review by OCPO, in collaboration with the **Dallas Police Department's Internal Affairs Division (IAD)**, to determine the appropriate type of investigation:

Investigation Types

- **Control Number (CN):**
For allegations that could result in a written reprimand or higher. Investigated by the Internal Affairs Division.
- **Division Referral (DR):**
For less severe allegations that may result in corrective actions such as Advice and Instruction, Documented Counseling, or a Supervisor's Report of Correction. Investigated by the officer's division.
- **No Investigation (NI):**
For cases that will not be investigated by IAD (e.g., allegations submitted after 60 days or failing to meet legal requirements).
- **Public Integrity (PI):**
For allegations of criminal conduct by police officers. The Public Integrity Unit investigates these. All complaints that may rise to the level of a criminal offense, including anonymous submissions, are forwarded to this unit.
- **Administrative Inquiry Investigation:**
Investigations into misconduct or improper police handling may be needed even without formal complaints. This includes cases involving unidentified employees, vague allegations, City Manager referrals, third-party claims, anonymous reports of criminal activity, directives from leadership, and instances where the complainant may be untruthful.

Reasons for No Investigation (NI)

- **Does Not Meet Criteria:** Complainant refused to provide a written statement (per TX GC 614.022)

- **Duplicate Complaint:** Allegation already under review or previously addressed.
- **Failure to Articulate:** No clear allegation of misconduct was provided.
- **Guilt or Innocence:** Complaint challenges legal guilt, not officer conduct
- **Information Only:** Request for or provision of unrelated information
- **More Information Needed:** Insufficient information to proceed.
- **No Violation:** Preliminary review finds no policy violation.
- **No Violation (BWC):** Body Worn Camera review confirms no misconduct.
- **Non-Employee:** Complaint involves a non-DPD individual.
- **Sixty-Day:** Complaint received more than 60 days after the incident with no good cause.
- **Third Party:** Complainant was not a victim or witness of the incident.

The Community Police Oversight Board works to build public trust between the Dallas Police Department and the communities it serves by providing fair and thorough oversight of the Department.

About the Board

The Community Police Oversight Board (CPOB) was established by the Dallas City Council through city ordinance and is composed of 15 voting members, with one representative from each City Council district. The Chair of the Board is appointed by the Mayor, and the Vice Chair is appointed by the City Council. The board acts as an advisory body to the Chief of Police, the City Manager, and the City Council. The Office of Community Police Oversight (OCPO) provides support and technical assistance to the CPOB.

Our Mission

The mission of the CPOB is to enhance the public's trust by ensuring that complaints of misconduct against departmental employees are conducted fairly and thoroughly, are transparent, and provide accessible means to the complaint process.

Attend a Board Meeting

CPOB monthly meetings are held on the second Tuesday of each month, except in July during City Council recess, and begin promptly at 5:30 p.m. Meetings take place at Dallas City Hall, with a virtual WebEx option available for those unable to attend in person.
