## History/Background



1959

DTC built Kalita Humphreys Theater designed by renowned Frank Lloyd Wright 1973

DTC donated the building to the City of Dallas

DTC to operate, City to provide maintenance

1989

Porte-cochere enclosed and lobby expanded


Education wing added

1968

Interior of theater and lobby altered, parking added, Heldt Annex building constructed

## History/Background





2005

KHT designated as a Dallas Historic Landmark

•Original 1959-1960 configuration designated as primary period of significance



2019

DTC's Third Lease Renewal executed

• Includes DTC's responsibility to update Master Plan for KHT

New Master Plan developed for KHT funded by 2006 Bond

•Not adopted by City Council



2010

Updated Master Plan submitted to OAC per 2019 Lease Renewal

### **Current Status and Needs**



#### Dallas Theater Center Stewardship:

- DTC leadership has expressed interest in partnering with the City regarding future plans for the KHT
- 2019 lease renewal updated 1973 DTC's operating model to include Equitable Access Plan to reflect Dallas Cultural Plan's priorities of Equity and Space
  - Three-year Equitable Access Plan began FY 23 and ends in FY 25
  - Includes anchor tenants Uptown Players (Kalita) and Second Thought Theater (Heldt Annex Building)
- 2019 lease renewal updated original maintenance clause for DTC to maintain the Kalita and Heldt in a clean, safe condition and in good order and repair while using the premises
  - City is responsible for capital repairs and improvements
  - 1973 management agreement stated that City was responsible for all maintenance



### **Current Status and Needs**



#### KHT is an important cultural asset with critical investment needs and repairs

- DTC presented Updated Master Plan to QoLAC on January 17, 2023
  - DTC funded \$2M updated Master Plan by Diller, Scofidio + Renfro
  - Updated DTC Master Plan cost estimate: \$305 million
  - 2024 Bond Program budget for Critical Facilities totals between ~\$224M (low scenario) and ~\$267M (high scenario)
- In April 2023, DTC informed OAC that they would not seek funding for updated Master Plan from 2024 Bond Program in lieu of private fundraising campaign
- In August 2023, the Community Bond Task Force (CBTF) Critical Facilities Sub-Committee recommends \$5.9M\* in major maintenance for KHT including:
  - HVAC repair/replacement
  - Fire alarm replacement
  - Public safety upgrades
  - Security upgrades
  - Elevator upgrades
  - Interior/exterior ADA accessibility enhancements/upgrades
  - Exterior repairs including water infiltration mitigation
  - Cultural Facilities requested \$50M for deferred maintenance to Critical Facilities Sub-Committee for 12 OAC facilities, including KHT



### **Future Plans**



- Fifth Amendment from 2021 will extend DTC's lease until June 1, 2025
  - No renewal option unless expressly granted by the City in writing
- Mayor Johnson's QoLAC policy priority regarding KHT:
  - Examine the possibility of establishing an independent, non-profit entity that can take the lead in restoring the Kalita Humphreys Theater and manage the site



## **Potential Next Steps**



- Enhance continued partnership with Park and Recreation Department to improve Kalita Campus
  - PKR and OAC have proven success on past joint ventures
- Establish a community task force to evaluate current status and needs
  - Report back to QoLAC by Q2 of FY 24
- Identify potential private/public partnership entity that can raise and leverage funds to restore and manage KHT
  - Brief QoLAC again by Q3 of FY 24
- Receive feedback from QoLAC Committee
