On October 23, 2024, City Council will consider the Fiscal Year 2024-25 Cultural Organizations Program (COP) contracts with 56 Dallas-based non-profit arts and cultural organizations. The Cultural Organizations Program contracts with cultural organizations with budgets ranging from \$100,000 to over \$10 million to provide an annual season of programming for residents and visitors of Dallas. The following pages list organizations with their recommended contract amounts totaling \$6,415,236 for FY 2024-25.

The COP Guidelines, eligibility, scoring, and review process are aligned with Dallas Cultural Plan goals and are approved annually by City Council. Following guideline adoption, information sessions are conducted, and organizations apply through an online grant system. The applications are scored by resident panels composed of at least 60% ALAANA (African, Latinx, Asian, Arab, Native American) individuals.

Scoring criteria of applications totals 100 points. Seventy of the 100 points are allocated to the review panel. The remaining 30 points of total 100 points are allocated to OAC Administrative Scoring. The following is a breakdown of the categories of scoring. Further detailed scoring information can be found on pages 10 through 13 of the attached *FY 2024-25 Cultural Organizations Program Guidelines* as approved by City Council on February 28, 2024.

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Staff Diversity

Following rigorous review of scores and past funding amounts, the FY 2024-25 awards were unanimously recommended by the Arts and Culture Advisory Commission on September 19, 2024. For FY 2024-25, 56 non-profit organizations are recommended for over \$6.4M funding. This funding represents an increase of \$159,958, or an approximately 2.6% budget increase from FY 2023-24 due to higher use of the Hotel Occupancy Tax percentage for the program. OAC continues to leverage the use of HOT funds in COP due to the direct impact funded organizations have on the Dallas arts ecosystem and its nexus to cultural tourism.

Five organizations are recommended for COP contracts that were not part of the 2023-24 COP program. The four first-time organizations in the COP are: Pegasus Media Project, Art House Dallas, The Artist Outreach, and the Nasher Sculpture Center. Deep Vellum Publishing, Inc., was part of the program in FY 2022-23, did not apply in FY 2023-24, and has rejoined for the FY 2024-25 year. The attached table below includes each recommended organization's name, contract amount, contract amount as percentage of annual budget, organization tier based on operating revenue, and mission statement.

Organization tiers are defined as follows:





BACKGROUND

The published scope of the project is to create highly visible, welcoming artwork for a dog park. The scope of the project is a site-specific installation of an artist designed and fabricated canine themed sculpture. The artwork seeks engagement and to elicit curiosity from viewers of all ages through design and high visibility. The artwork must require little or no maintenance and be safe and appropriate for public outdoor work. It will enhance the City of Dallas Public Art Collection with diversity of style, scale, media, and artists, including ethnicity and gender.

ARTIST BACKGROUND

Artist Sujin Lim is an internationally acclaimed artist. Sujin Lim earned a BFA and MFA in Sculpture from Seoul National University and an MFA in Public Art and New Artistic Strategy from the Bauhaus University in Weimar. She was awarded a scholarship at the Skowhegan School of Painting and Sculpture in 2015. She has worked internationally on public art for 14 years and participated in residency programs across the globe. Lim has successfully collaborated with architects, engineers, and fabrication teams on over 25 public art commissions.

Her practice focuses on finding new ways of seeing the world within one's surroundings. She creates site-specific sculpture and installation projects which serve as points of attraction for diverse groups of people to come together.

Her art practice involves research, the use of metaphor, and building physical, sitespecific sculptures and installations to transform actual sites into aspirational images with the following question: "What might this space have become if the people using it

had their desires met?". Sujin Lim creates empowering and uplifting art to integrate sensations and emotions into the built environment. She reveals the potential of a space in continuous transition such as the dog park to become a distinct site of inspiration.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

Sujin Lim performed a thorough site analysis during an initial site visit with distinct community engagement elements. Her artwork Natural Encounter fuses an organic, whimsical artwork with the geometrical Crockett Dog Park to create a welcoming, iconic identity for the park and a community friendly sculpture.

The sculpture is 17' long, 5' wide and 21' tall on a 12' diameter and 18" high underground concrete foundation. It will be surrounded by rubber mulch. The polyester resin and fiberglass sculpture is supported by a rust proof metal armature and sealed with UV and graffiti protective coating.

This project should serve as a wayfinding object, an interactive public art piece, and unique Instagram background for the community. Visitors will be able to walk underneath the sculpture and experience the installation intimately.

Natural Encounter will represent the relationship between living beings and nature by bringing the image of a cloud softly sitting on the nose of a dog into the middle of the park. Nature permits us to experience its wonders; it can also calm our minds and souls. The sculpture will attempt to bring a dreamlike moment to our busy everyday lives.



SUBJECT City Facilities Partners Update – AT&T Performing Arts Center

The City of Dallas Office of Arts and Culture typically contracts with various Dallas-based arts and culture non-profit organizations for two purposes. The most common is contracting for artistic and cultural services for Dallas residents and visitors. More uniquely, Dallas contracts with select organizations to provide long-term management of City-owned cultural venues. The Office of Arts and Culture (OAC) will provide a series of monthly memoranda as an update on each of our facility management partners in alignment with the Dallas Cultural Plan 2018 initiative to, "increase transparency in facility policies and structures."

About the AT&T Performing Arts Center¹

The AT&T Performing Arts Center is a nonprofit foundation that operates and programs a 10-acre campus comprised of three premier performance venues and a park in downtown Dallas. The Center's mission is to provide a public gathering place that strengthens community and fosters creativity through the presentation of performing arts and arts education programs.

The Center's performance spaces include:

- Margot and Bill Winspear Opera House, designed by Foster + Partners of London, is a 2,200-seat venue with acoustic performance halls.
- Dee and Charles Wyly Theatre is a 575-seat theatre designed by REX/OMA, Joshua Prince-Ramus (partner in charge) and Rem Koolhaas.
- Annette Strauss Square, designed by Foster + Partners, is an open-air entertainment venue with lawn and patio seating for 2,000
- Elaine D. and Charles A. Sammons Park is an urban park designed by Michel Desvigne and includes the Information Center designed by Foster + Partners.

Use Agreement with the City of Dallas

The use agreement between the City of Dallas and the Dallas Center for the Performing Arts Foundation (now known as the AT&T Performing Arts Center or AT&T PAC) is the key document that governs the relationship between the City and the foundation. It outlines the responsibilities, obligations, and rights of both parties regarding the management, operation, and use of the performing arts facilities. Over time, this agreement has been amended to adapt to changing circumstances and needs. The

current annual City funding allocation to the Center is \$2,500,000 for annual City operating expenses and \$1,500,000 for additional annual operating City expenses, totaling \$4,000,000. Below is a detailed summary of the original agreement and its amendments:

Original Use Agreement (2005) – The original Use Agreement was executed on December 15, 2005. The agreement was part of the larger public-private partnership that allowed for the creation of the AT&T Performing Arts Center. Key elements of the agreement include:

- Land Contribution: The City of Dallas provided prime land in the Dallas Arts District for the construction of the performing arts center.
- Construction and Funding: The Dallas Center for the Performing Arts Foundation (DCPAF) was responsible for raising the funds needed to design, build, and equip the facilities. The center was constructed using a combination of private donations and public funds.
- Operations and Maintenance: The DCPAF (later AT&T PAC) is responsible for the ongoing operation and maintenance of the facilities. The foundation is required to ensure that the facilities are properly maintained to high standards, both aesthetically and functionally, to preserve their value and attractiveness to the public and to performance groups.
- City Funding Obligation: Annually, the City shall pay a portion of the operation and utilities cost in an amount not to exceed \$2,500,000.
- Public Use: The foundation agreed to make the facilities available for public use, including hosting city-sponsored events, community performances, and other activities that would benefit Dallas residents. This public access is seen as a key aspect of the City's contribution, ensuring that the arts center will serve the broader community, not just the foundation's resident organizations.
- Term of Agreement: The original agreement set a 40-year lease term with five (5) consecutive renewal terms of ten (10) years each.

Since the original 2005 agreement, there have been four (4) amendments made to the agreement to reflect changes in the center's operations, financial health, and community needs.

- First Amendment (2008) The first amendment, addressed financial and operational details related to construction of an additional parking garage (located under the Moody Performance Hall) and clarified certain aspects of the operational and maintenance responsibilities of the foundation regarding the additional garage, including allowing for use by DISD.
- **Second Amendment (2008)** The Second amendment was executed in December 2008 to manage and minimize the sound impact of the Annette Strauss Square on the Morton H. Meyerson Symphony Center. This amendment

introduced a joint plan for annual scheduling of events including day and time restrictions on activities and events performed at the Strauss.

- Third Amendment (2016) The third amendment in 2016 dealt primarily with the financial sustainability of the AT&T PAC. This amendment came after a thorough review of the center's operational model and its ability to meet its financial obligations while continuing to provide high-quality cultural experiences for the public. Key aspects of this amendment included a debt restructuring agreement with the City of Dallas as well as additional funding in collaboration with OAC to provide an annual amount equal to \$1,500,000 for operating expenses related to the Center in consideration of the Center's ongoing work to benefit the performing arts in Dallas. The additional funding began on November 1, 2016, and will continue through and conclude on November 1, 2025.
- Fourth Amendment (2021) The Fourth amendment was executed in March 2021 to amend the booking agreement and restrictions established in the second amendment to allow for further collaboration and coordination of booking activities to maximize the use of Annette Strauss Square and the Morton H. Meyerson Symphony Center.

2024 Bond

In the 2024 Bond for cultural arts facilities, the AT&T Performing Arts Center is slated to receive allocated bond funds for the Center campus, and for the Annette Strauss Square, Winspear Opera House, and Wyly Theatre (schedule will be determined at a later date). Below are the amounts of the 2024 Bond allocated for each project:
