






# **Environmental Management Consent Decree**



- Entered into with USDOJ, EPA and TCEQ for Stormwater Permit compliance violations (2006)
- Implement a certified Environmental Management System (EMS)
- Minimum environmental staffing requirements
- Minimum inspection frequencies & public response times
- Semi-annual compliance reporting requirements






# **Environmental Management Consent Decree**

- Monetary fine (\$800,000)






### **DWU Unserved Areas Program**



- DWU began tracking unserved areas in 1998
- 125 areas needed water or wastewater service at an anticipated cost of \$68M dollars
- Today, we estimate there are 61 unserved areas at an anticipated cost of \$62M dollars






#### **How Are Areas Identified?**



- 1998 Comprehensive study performed by Carter and Burgess
- 2019 Information updated using latest Geographic Information System water and wastewater infrastructure data
- 2020 Currently cross-referencing Texas Commission on Environmental Quality septic system permit data with current unserved area information






### **Preliminary Analysis**

- An in-depth look was conducted for each area
- Needs were separated based on occupied vs unoccupied

Project Area 69A-3-A / Denmark St.

Rough alignments and cost estimates to extend water and wastewater service to vacant and occupied properties. Site-specific survey and engineering design required to validate proposed alignments and costs.

#### **SUBJECT Environment and Sustainability Task Force Update**

#### **BACKGROUND**

City Council Resolution #20-688, which adopted the Comprehensive Environmental and Climate Action Plan (CECAP), includes a requirement that "the City Manager identify and convene an Environment and Sustainability Advisory Committee, under guidelines established by the City Manager, comprised of professionals and community members to advise on environment, sustainability, and CECAP implementation." The 15-member committee has been selected to represent each of the CECAP's eight sectors plus environmental advocacy, justice, and public health, with the final committee reflecting a diverse range of backgrounds, experience, and expertise.

This list reflects a wide range of knowledge and expertise. Careful consideration has been given to ensure a membership that is reflective of the diverse population of Dallas. Individuals on the original list of candidates, will be engaged as subject matter experts as needed.

#### **ETHICS**

Each Task Force member will be subject to, and must comply with, Chapter 12A, "Code of Ethics," of the Dallas City Code. Task Force members must comply with Chapter 12A as if they are city officials. They will (1) be furnished with a copy of the Code of Ethics as required by Section 12A-42; (2) be required to sign the ethics pledge in Section 12A-42.1; and (3) receive ethics training as required by Section 12A-45.

#### **EQUITY**

Climate change will affect everyone, but not everyone will be affected equally—the effects of climate change will disproportionately impact communities with the least means to adapt, and who have been burdened with negative environmental impacts due to institutionalized discriminatory practices. Equity training will be an ongoing requirement of all Environment and Sustainability Task Force members.

#### **NEXT STEPS**

After the 15-member committee is finalized, the Vice Chair will be nominated by the Task Force Chair and voted on by the entire ENVS Committee. The first meeting of the Task Force will be in September, at which onboarding will occur. Onboarding will include required viewing of a video on ethics requirements, as well as all associated paperwork and conflict of interest disclosure statements. Task Force members will be briefed on the CECAP, including its development and implementation framework. Ongoing education and training will occur through the members' terms as needed.
