The following is an explanation of the reasons for and the data supporting the modification(s):

Plan Number 131227 - The Horse Park is an asset whose single entrance/exit faces District 5; there is no easy access to the Horse Park from any neighborhood in its current district. The Horse Park would be a significant asset around which future District 5 leadership and community members could rally to maximize the facility's potential and benefit to the

members could rally to maximize the facility's potential and benefit to the community. Additionally, the Pemberton Hill Neighborhood Association was instrumental in supporting the development of the Horse Park and believe that it is an integral part of their neighborhood.

Plan No. 132556 (133010) - Kiest Park has historically been in District 4 and it's a park that is utilized by District 4 and to balance population.

Plan No. 132432 (133000) - This amendment respects the wishes of residents of D6 and D13 with minimal change to demographics based on the original map submitted. This amendment: --uses Lenel

Place as the border between D6 and D13 in Midway Hollow (south of Walnut Hill/ east of Marsh Northaven Road and Royal Lane, west of Webb Chapel. -- Keeps neighborhoods south of Forest Lane between Josey Lane and Webb Chapel (north of Royal) in D13.

Plan No. 132516 - The proposed map is amending district lines for District 2, District 5, District 7, District 9, and District 14. The proposed map maintains communities who share similar interest such as Owenwood, Parkdale, Ash Creek Greenbelt, Claremont, Hillridge, Old Buckner Terrace and Lakeland Hills. The redesigned borders will allow for the continuation of collaboration between neighborhoods and community stakeholders for ongoing and future capital improvement projects, corridor studies, and future development of parks and recreation centers in the area. Collaboration and funding for capital improvement projects are in place for the Parkdale and Ferguson corridor study and Lawnview public improvements. The proposed map is designed to keep the neighborhood of Parkdale/Lawnview intact with Parkdale Lake and keep the community in District 7. Over the past few decades, the neighborhood has been advocating and working hard to keep their community together. The map is also designed to keep Deep Ellum Bark Park, Harwood Park, and Lubben park together. Adjusting the lines, will prevent disruption of the progress being done and will maintain communities together. The changes in District 9 were adjusted to keep the Casa View neighborhood together.

Modification Summary – MOD ID: COD-CC-Dist. 2-7 – proposes changes to D2, D3, D4, D5, D6, D7, D9, D13, D14

This modification is proposed by CM Jesse Moreno, DMPT Carolyn King Arnold, CM Adam Bazaldua, CM Paula Blackmon, and CM Gay Willis, at a public meeting of the Dallas City Council.

D3 & D4:

This map moves the Kiest Park neighborhood into Council District 4 for the purposes of creating the center or core for the community (social, economic, etc.) reasons. The park helps to create and maintain community synergy! This modification speaks to providing a community of interest & map; nexus which supports social, political access points whereby community can assemble to promote/voice their positions on all incidents/scenarios which affects their day-to-day life experiences. Keeping the community "glued" helps to create the village needed to make Dallas safe – definitely utilizing the Equity Lenses. The proposed amendment is designed to support the greater interest of community interest, culture, social, economic, educational, and political access, and issues as it relates to quality of life and equity.

D5:

The Horse Park is an asset whose single entrance/exit faces District 5; there is no easy access to the Horse Park from any neighborhood in its current district. The Horse Park would be a significant asset around which future District 5 leadership and community members could rally to maximize the facility's potential and benefit to the community. Additionally, the Pemberton Hill Neighborhood Association was instrumental in supporting the development of the Horse Park and believe that it is an integral part of their neighborhood.

D6 &13:

This amendment respects the wishes of residents of D6 and D13 with minimal change to demographics based on the original map submitted.

D6 & D13:

This amendment:

- Uses Lenel Place as the border between D6 and D13 in Midway Hollow (south of Walnut Hill/ east of Marsh Lane/ north of NW HWY/west of Midway Road).
- Moves into D 6 the neighborhood between Northaven Road and Royal Lane, west of Webb Chapel.
- Keeps neighborhoods south of Forest Lane between Josey Lane and Webb Chapel (north of Royal) in D13.

D2, D5, D7, D9 & D14:

The proposed map is amending District 2 far east border from Centerville Rd. to Gus Thomasson Rd, and Ferguson Rd to John West Road, Ashdown Dr. and N. Buckner Blvd. The Southern District 2 line is being amended from E. Grand Avenue to the outskirts of Owenwood Neighborhood. The central District 2 line is being moved from Young St. to Woods Street and extending District 14's line to Houston St. The district 7 line is being moved to include Parkdale neighborhood, moving the district line from Parkdale Lake to Bisbee Dr. and moving the Northern D7 border line to extend to Ferguson Rd, Ash Creek, and White Rock Creek. The District 5 NE line is being extended from Military Parkway to Forney Rd. and from Hunnicut Rd. to Forney Rd., along Military Parkway.

One of the principal tenets of the redistricting process is that it is important to keep "communities of interest" intact. Although the Parkdale neighborhood is currently in District 7, the map submitted by the Redistricting Commission moves it into District 5, but changes their western boundary, without including Parkdale Lake.

According to the Parkdale Neighborhood's leadership, their neighborhood association boundaries were drawn in 1997 and were based on the Parkdale subdivision's boundary created in 1927. It is extremely important to this

community that their

entire neighborhood be in one district and that the Lake be included as well. extending the northwestern boundary of District 5 to include Parkdale Lake would have no significant change on the total population or demographics.


