CREATIVE ARTS CENTER OF DALLAS

The Creative Arts Center of Dallas (CAC) will serve nearly 15,000 people by hosting 500 classes, workshops and events in the 2019-2020 year. This will include visual art classes; professional development workshops; outreach programs for underserved groups; community-based shows, department shows and

the White Rock Artist Studio Tour. Outreach programs are: ArtAbility, Art as a Second Language and Camp MetalHead. It will host an instructor show in December of 2019 at the Bath House Cultural Center.

CAC is researching the feasibility of possible collaborations in the process with AIN, Austin Street Shelter, Baylor Hospital, The Bridge, Dallas Arboretum and St. Matthews Cathedral Episcopal Church, The Meadows Museum as well as deepening its collaboration with Cafe Momentum to offer on-going programming at its new Community Service Center. CRY HAVOC THEATER CO.

During the 2019-2020 season the cultural organization shall create and produce two new works and begin the development of a third new work. They include: 2020 Vision, directed by Shelby-Allison Hibbs and presented at the South Dallas Cultural Center in January 2020, Dark Was The Night, Cold Was The Ground, directed by Ruben Carrazana and presented online in July 2020, and Endlings, directed by Mara Richards Bim with script development throughout 2020 in preparation for an online production in October 2020.

2020 Vision will run January 9-18, 2020 at South Dallas Cultural Center. 2020 VISION addresses how digital technology has evolved from a set of tools to an invisible extension of the human body and how difficult it is to avoid "plugging in" to the digital landscape every hour of every day. Dark Was The Night, Cold Was The Ground will run online from July 13-19, 2020. The production will discuss the two golden phonograph records containing images and audio from Earth were launched into space in 1977 in the hopes that they may one day reach extraterrestrial life. In the year 4040, one of the Voyager Golden Records reaches a dying planet, and its inhabitants head out to find where it came from: Earth. Endlings will be developed throughout 2020 in preparation for an October 2020 production. The play will address climate change and climate grief against the backdrop of Covid-19 and ecological crisis. Endlings will be a documentary/verbatim theatre piece created from interviews and other source material and will explore humanity's relationship to nature and the emotional toll we face when we become disconnected with nature.

Additionally, during the 2019-2020 season Cry Havoc Theater Company will also launch its Teen Critics program. The program will run January through June and provide training and an outlet for teens to review art, interview professional artists, and share their perspectives on specific artworks from a variety of disciplines. The writings will be published on Cry Havoc's website. Finally, during the shutdown, Cry Havoc will launch it's regular open mic series, *Project Ghostlight*. Held regularly during the shutdown, the series features a professional host and musical guest alongside performers of all ages sharing a selection of text inspired by a three-word theme.

In addition to TechNotes the organization also provides its partner schools with, video conference sessions with DCS musicians, musician visits to classrooms, chamber music coaching and in school assembly concerts.

DALLAS HOLOCAUST MUSEUM/CENTER FOR EDUCATION AND TOLERANCE

The Dallas Holocaust and Human Rights Museum is a public educational resource that provides lifechanging lessons to its more than 94,500 annual visitors and program participants, almost half of whom are students. The Museum also ensures that more than 18,000 economically disadvantaged students visit the Museum free of charge each year through the Museum Experience Fund. The Museum seeks to positively impact attitudes and behaviors. As the only Holocaust museum in North Texas, Oklahoma, Louisiana, and Arkansas, the lessons taught at the Museum encourage students and other visitors to be "Upstanders," individuals who stand up for what is right when it would be easier to do nothing. The majority of our student visitors come from the Dallas Independent School District (DISD) as well as Dallas County. The new 55,000 square-foot Museum, which opened on September 18, 2019, anticipates approximately 200,000 annual visitors, more than double the visitorship in its current 6,000 square-foot facility. The museum will also continue to grow the Museum Experience Fund to support scholarships to allow up to 36,000 economically challenged students and Title 1 schools and teachers attend the Museum free of charge in the coming year, which has far exceeded the anticipated 47% increase in requests. The Museum temporarily closed in March 2020, just six months after opening, due to COVID-19 mandates. In response to this closure, the Museum created free virtual education and community programs to bring our important lessons to students, educators, and the community. Virtual programs, available on the Museum's website, include TEKS-aligned lessons, two virtual summer camps, a virtual special exhibition tour, 3-5 weekly virtual public programs, and virtual student field trips. Due to the success of these programs, which have already reached more than 19,000 students, educators, and participants, they remain available even after the Museum reopened to the public on August 14, 2020. The Museum will resume in-person events when it is deemed safe to do so by city, county, and state officials. The Museum welcomes visitors to the permanent and special exhibitions with proper safety precautions and will continue virtual education and community programs. What has not faltered is our commitment to change behavior through education. The Museum is dedicated to providing a thoughtful space for authentic connection, communication, and reflection, whether physically or virtually.

DALLAS MUSEUM OF ART

The cultural agency will serve more than 2 million visitors in person and virtually by presenting 4-ticketed exhibitions (including 4 nationally- or internationally-touring exhibitions), numerous smaller-scale exhibitions and installations, and approximately 4,000 educational programs. Free general admission provides the community with access to the Museum's global collection of more than 24,000 works of art, which helps to maintain a diverse audience. The DMA's entire permanent collection has been digitized and made available to the public through the Museum's website and smartphone app. DMA Education Programs will continue to serve visitors on-site at the Museum, off-site at partner sites, and through sustained collaborations that engage populations of all ages, abilities, and other defining circumstances. The Center for Creative Connections ignites curiosity and affirms a multitude of perspectives through dynamic experiences with art, applying a community-centered approach to supporting the DMA's goal of broadening and diversifying its audiences, and creating content that is compelling, engaging and

accessible. Family School and Youth Programs will provide opportunities for children from birth through adolescence in early learning classes (which serve ages 0-7), family workshops, summer camps, guided school tours (currently online), tween and teen workshops, a Teen Advisory Council, and Pop-Up Art Spots in the galleries. The Go van Gogh Outreach Program will continue to offer free art presentations to North Texas students and teachers. The DMA Community Engagement team collaborates with community organizations and residents to develop on- and off-site participatory art experiences that reflect the voices and creativity of Dallas. Access Programs provide for audiences with special needs, including Sensory Kits, for families of children with autism spectrum disorders; resources and programsfor individuals with vision disabilities, individuals with early-stage dementia; and individuals with developmental disabilities. Monthly Late Nights and Second Thursdays with a Twist served visitors until the Museum's closure in March. Virtual Date Night online modules were launched in August to connect with adult audiences as well as new slow looking tours. The DMA will continue to provide Gallery Talks, Tours, and Lectures in which individuals and groups may participate (online and/or in-person as circumstances allow). Arts & Letters Live will feature award-winning authors and artists during in person and virtual talks.

DALLAS WIND SYMPHONY

For the 2019-20 season, the Dallas Wind Symphony (Dallas Winds) performed four subscription season concerts and one holiday special at the Meyerson Symphony Center. The tentatively scheduled free public concert at Fair Park as part of the Fair Park Fourth celebration, was cancelled by Spectra due to COVID restrictions. In connection with the Dallas Winds' long-standing partnership with Dallas ISD, the organization performed six concerts for fifth grade students at Fair Park Music Hall. The Dallas Winds could not present a scheduled concert at the Meyerson Symphony center as the grand finale of Dallas Winds Band Camp due to covid restrictions; and two concerts in connection with the Dallas Winds Honor Band residency at Conrad High School were reduced to one concert because of COVID restrictions. The two-day Invitational Windband Festival scheduled at the Meyerson Center in April was cancelled due to COVID restrictions. The six-day Dallas Winds Band Camp for Dallas ISD students at Booker T. Washington High School in June 2020 was cancelled due to COVID restrictions. The scheduled two semester residency at Conrad High School coaching band students and special needs students from throughout the Dallas ISD under the umbrella title of Dallas Winds Honor Band was reduced to six months due to COVID restrictions. The Dallas Winds in partnership with WRR FM increased the number of Monday Night at the Symphony broadcasts between March – September 2020 reaching a significantly larger audience than was planned for 19/20. Dallas Winds added a new series of live-streamed chamber concerts during the Mar-Sep 2020 period as well as a new series of online workshops for high school band students, both of which increased the size of our audience as projected in the original scope of services.

FINE ARTS CHAMBER PLAYERS

Fine Arts Chamber Players (FACP) serves the community through a series of concerts, post-performance dialogues, and educational outreach programs. FACP's two long-standing concert series are free, open to the public, and traditionally staged in the Dallas Arts District at venues that are accessible by public transportation and are ADA-compliant. Concerts are held in the afternoons to best suit a wide range of ages.

Because of the new, unprecedented reach online content affords (detailed below), FACP served over 25,000 (duplicated, projected) in this grant cycle, more than twice the projected 9,600.

Due to COVID-19 restrictions with public gatherings and public education, adjustments were made to FACP's free programs, beginning in March 2020. Public performances that were cancelled were replaced with other online content, other public concerts were staged virtually, and FACP educational outreach moved to remote learning models. Initially, FACP intended to launch a new initiative in Spring 2020: Beethoven in the Community. These community concerts have been postponed until Spring 2022, at the earliest.

The organization produces Hallam Family Concerts (HFC). These concerts are monthly free chamber music concerts; October-May (excluding December); Saturday afternoons; traditionally staged in the Horchow Auditorium at the Dallas Museum of Art; feature preeminent professional musicians from North Texas. Hallam concerts are followed by CODA, a moderated Q&A with the musicians. The final three HFC of the season (March, April, May 2020) were cancelled. However, new online content was created in the spring and early summer to entertain and reach our audience and new patrons.

FACP also produces the annual Basically Beethoven Festival; weekly free chamber music concerts; Sunday afternoons in July 2020; typically held at Moody Performance Hall; each afternoon includes a Rising Star Recital (gifted student musicians) and a Feature Performance (local, professional musicians). In 2020, the 40th annual series was reimagined as the Basically Beethoven Festival-in-Place: all performances were pre-recorded and premiered on YouTube.com/FineArtsChamberPlayers. Other than the change in location and delivery method, the programs remained the same in content, length, performers, and quality. Only the final concert, which originally featured a singer, changed once that was not advisable due to COVID-related concerns about spread.

The organization will also provide the following free music education programs: Music Residencies (1,100), FACP places Teaching Artists at 3 Dallas schools to provide regular individual and/or small group music instruction, free of charge to students. FACP's educational performance troupes (Dream Collectors and Music A-Z) retired in the 2019-20 school year.

GREATER DALLAS YOUTH ORCHESTRA

Due to COVID-19, the amount of rehearsals were reduced from our anticipated 175 to 166 due to two of our ensembles not rehearsing from March through May, 2020. Most of our ensembles moved to an online format, however for the GDYO and the Philharmonic, our conductors believed their music was too complex to adapt well to online learning. Moreover, we continued to anticipate that we could make up rehearsal sessions for those ensembles during the summer. However, this proved to be impossible. The number of performances we anticipated was reduced from 18 to 13 due to our cancelling performances from March to May, 2020. Our greatest deficit for the past season came under the "Class / Workshop" section, since this represents our community engagement program with the DISD. TEATRO HISPANO DE DALLAS

Teatro Hispano de Dallas (Teatro Dallas) will provide four major mainstage events at the Latino Cultural Center and serve approximately 13,000 individuals this year through its programs and events. These include a regional premiere in the fall of the play Villa, a production that explores how humans deal with

monuments and architecture associated with trauma. Talkbacks about the content with the actors will be scheduled for the opening. TD will also produce three events for its CO-LAB series, which is a free community-based, interactive project allowing the public to directly engage with artists at nonperformance events. These will include a theater workshop in September called Fissures of Reality, a public art event called Monuments In the City in October, and a world premiere screenning called Theater for Healing in February. These will take palce across diverse neighborhoods and partnering organizations include Top Ten Records and The MAC Gallery. The winter production to follow will be the 18th International Performance Festival, in which two groups representing Lebanon, the U.S. and Mexico will present works at the intersection between theater, music, dance and performance art. A workshop for performers in Middle Eastern dance techniques will be presented during the run of the festival by Lebanese artist Alia Mohammed. Aditionally, Turkish poetry will be presented in a third, free communitybased interactive event with a reception featuring middle eastern food. In the spring and summer, three original virutal works created by Teatro Dallas will celebrate Latinx voices and culture. These three programs include an original audio paly called Pizcas, which will premiere on May 1st for international labor day and run through June. Pizcas honors migrant workers through the poiginant memories of a migrant child laboring alongside his family in the fields of South Texas in the 1970s. In June, Faces of Cement City will present the untold story of West Dallas in Cement City. The work is based on interviews and film footage, and this original 10-minute documentary will inform the staging of a future, full-length production. In July, Bongo Talks will be created as a thirty minute filmed production with a fifteen minute, live-streaming Q&A with youth ages 5-10. The production is bilingual, for all ages and interactive, and focuses on the importance of imagination and the emotions as a source for coping with stressful situations. This filmed production is aligned with TEKS learning and addresses social -emotional skills through puppets, live action, and an original musical score. In August, TD will produce one filmed, pilot poetry project that will serve as the basis for a future series called POEISIS, which will celebrate the rich tradition of Latinx poetry in indigenous, caribbean, Spanish and Ladino languages without Englsih translation. This virtual poetry series will begin with the poem of Porfirio Barba Jacob, a lesser known Colombian poet. All virtual content will be free and distributed widely through our platforms which include constant contact, FB, and our website.

The work is based on interviews and film footage, and an original 10-minute documentary will be presented in the lobby during the run of the production. A weeklong spring theater camp will also be presented at the Latino Cultural Center, where students will explore a variety of acting and vocal techniques, write original scripts, create masks and explore international theater traditions culminating in a final, public demonstration. The production is bilingual, for all ages and interactive, and focuses on the ecology and Meso American mythology. Student outreach programs will be held after school and during the summer in the Emma Rodgers Learning Laboratory at BATC including our TNT (Teenagers and Theatre) apprenticeship program. The cultural organization will serve approximately 15,000 individuals through engagement programs including master classes, lecture/demonstrations, post-performance Q&As, special events and specifically curated performances with world-renown artists. It will include approximately 26 dance performances/events by dance companies representing four countries, and one Dallas debut, in addition to several special presentations, the TITAS favorite Big Barre, normally an outdoor dance class for up to 300 participants that will be held in the Winspear Opera House Lobby with Malandain Ballet Biarritz on February 8. TITAS felt the impact of the pandemic immediately. Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater (AAADT) cancelled their TITAS performances and engagement activities as soon as the company arrived in Dallas on Thursday, March 12. Our last live event, an Artist Salon with AAADT associate artistic director, Matthew Rushing, took place at Arts Mission Oak Cliff on March 12. While over 150 people registered for the event, sixty did attend even amid the confusion about shelter-in-place mandates, etc. Due to scheduling challenges and gathering and travel restrictions amid the CoVid-19 crisis, TITAS had to replace or cancel an additional three international dance company performances and engagement activities scheduled for the 2019-2020 season and another four international companies for the 2020-2021 season. Beginning August 2020, TITAS renewed focus on our collective communities with innovative ways to enrich our communities amid, and post, the COVID-19 crisis. In conjunction with the 2020:21 season announcement in August, TITAS introduced, executed, and is marketing a biweekly virtual salon series that is offering important conversations between TITAS and other national arts leaders. In addition, TITAS initiated a bi-monthly DFW Dance/Music Virtual Roundtable to offer local artists a forum to talk about the challenges and solutions associated with continuing to work through the global health crisis. In general, TITAS participates in numerous internship programs including the Mayor's summer internship program, SMU, and Booker T. Washington High School for the Performing and Visual Arts (BTWHSPVA). This summer BTWHSVA approved an 8-week paid internship with TITAS. While we are working on new ways to connect with our audiences, in the past, TITAS has offered free and discounted ticketing for K-12 and college students, and over 2,500 donated tickets to seniors, community centers, and special populations. The organization has made certain performances are financially accessible and are located in ADA compliant facilities. TITAS launched a new program in collaboration with Dance for PD® (Parkinson's Disease), local Dance for PD® dance educator, Misty Owens, visiting artists, and local health and cultural organizations including Presbyterian Hospital. 2019-2020, TITAS was able to complete two of the four Dance for PD® classes and plans to host three-four live or virtual Dance for PD® classes during the 2020-2021 season. In addition, various meetings are and were held throughout the year to support the administration of the cultural organization. Since CoVid-19, TITAS has seen exponential growth in planning meetings. Diversity is fundamental to the programming. Due to the crisis, TITAS is offering a shorter 7-company, All-American season and may include a collaboration with DAD for the 2021 Arts Month block party. Our first event, Virtually TITAS: a Window into the 2020:21 Season will be a free online event on October 6, 2020 and will feature testimonials from international artists and dances from all of the 2020:21 dance companies.

Consultant presented an in person, live, weekend dance production entitled, Harvest, at Moody Performance Hall on November 15 and 16, 2019 and streamed a virtual 10 Years | Distance Unites prooduction commemorating BWD's 10 years on social media platforms in June 2020. Productions were open-to-the-public events of high caliber, original, contemporary choreography. Harvest featured three dance pieces, Bruce Wood's Follow Me, a tribute to the U.S. Infantry, the world premiere, Live, Love, Laugh by Princess Grace Choreography Honoree and Jacob's Pillow Choreography Fellow Bryan Arias, and the world premiere of Joy Bollinger's In My Your Head, a perspective on today's political spirit. Ten Years | Distance Unites featured the world premiere ALLONE, a video comprised of seven short dances performed throughout prominent Dallas spaces reflecting the new normal. Harvest was preceded by preshow talks with the artists in the lobby and post-show Q+A's in the theater. BWD held two in-person, live studio events related to Harvest in order to engage our Dallas audience with insights into the process of choreographing and mounting the production. From October through March 3, 2020, BWD also offered free in-person dance classes twice a week at women's addiction rehabilitation facility, Nexus Recovery Center in a symbiotic effort to provide tools for healing and informing about upcoming performances. During this same timeframe, free in-peron dance classes were held twice a week for children at Mosaic Family Services, a shelter for the homeless and once per week at Heart House which serves refugees . We pivoted to virtual programming in March and produced a wide array of programs on the BWD Facebook, website, Vimeo, and Instagram platforms. We also streamed four archival works, Carved in Stone, Forbidden Paths, Follow Me, and In My Your Head. In July, BWD produced our inaugural, online 4-day summer dance intensive, WOODWORKS. TURTLE CREEK CHORALE, INC.

The world-renowned Turtle Creek Chorale (TCC) -- the most recorded male chorus in the world -- is celebrating its 40th Anniversary Season during this grant period with a revised schedule of programs inclusing a slate of one mainstage concert, three virtual chorus videos, an online educational program, and new Vodcast (podcast with video option).

The 2019 holiday season featured the Chorale's signature holiday performances with "40 Years of Fa La La" and featured a newcomer to the Dallas arts scene, Chloe Agnew of Celtic Woman. These four sold-out performances were held at the Moody Performance Hall where the TCC served approximately 4,000 patrons, including more than 200 complimentary tickets to individuals living with HIV/AIDS, senior citizens, high school choral students, and individuals from low-income areas.

Before the pandemic shutdown, the TCC provided a powerful educational workshop for the youth of Booker T. Washington High School for the Performing Arts through the *You Are Light Project*, an initiative designed to address suicide prevention, mental health issues, and bullying. Due to the pandemic, this program is now being taken online with a comprehensive set of modules available through Canvass to all teachers in the Dallas area and beyond, allowing us to scale this much-needed program to even more students across the city and country.

In September 2020, the TCC will launch "OffStage: Concerts and Conversations" – a new Vodcast (podcast with video option) featuring live musical performances surrounded by entertaining banter and enlightening conversation on various topics like racism, suicide prevention, LGBTQ+ equality, the COVID-19 pandemic, and more. An episode of the Vodcast will drop every two weeks and will be available on all podcast platforms (Apple, Spotify, etc.) and YouTube.

Since March of 2020, we have produced two virtual choir presenions and shared on YouTube and other social media outlets. We have two more scheduled to drop in the month of September with one being a partnership with the Women's Chorus of Dallas.

The Creative Arts Center of Dallas (CAC) will serve nearly 15,000 people by hosting 500 classes, workshops and events in the 2019-2020 year. This will include visual art classes; professional development workshops; outreach programs for underserved groups; community-based shows, department shows and the White Rock Artist Studio Tour. Outreach programs are: ArtAbility, Art as a Second Language and Camp MetalHead. It will host an instructor show in December of 2019 at the Bath House Cultural Center.

CRY HAVOC THEATER CO.

During the 2019-2020 season the cultural organization shall create and produce two new works and begin the development of a third new work. They include: 2020 Vision, directed by Shelby-Allison Hibbs and presented at the South Dallas Cultural Center in January 2020, Dark Was The Night, Cold Was The Ground, directed by Ruben Carrazana and presented online in July 2020, and Endlings, directed by Mara Richards Bim with script development throughout 2020 in preparation for an online production in October 2020.

2020 Vision will run January 9-18, 2020 at South Dallas Cultural Center. 2020 VISION addresses how digital technology has evolved from a set of tools to an invisible extension of the human body and how difficult it is to avoid "plugging in" to the digital landscape every hour of every day. Dark Was The Night, Cold Was The Ground will run online from July 13-19, 2020. The production will discuss the two golden phonograph records containing images and audio from Earth were launched into space in 1977 in the hopes that they may one day reach extraterrestrial life. In the year 4040, one of the Voyager Golden Records reaches a dying planet, and its inhabitants head out to find where it came from: Earth. Endlings will be developed throughout 2020 in preparation for an October 2020 production. The play will address climate change and climate grief against the backdrop of Covid-19 and ecological crisis. Endlings will be a documentary/verbatim theatre piece created from interviews and other source material and will explore humanity's relationship to nature and the emotional toll we face when we become disconnected with nature.

Additionally, during the 2019-2020 season Cry Havoc Theater Company will also launch its Teen Critics program. The program will run January through June and provide training and an outlet for teens to review art, interview professional artists, and share their perspectives on specific artworks from a variety of disciplines. The writings will be published on Cry Havoc's website. Finally, during the shutdown, Cry Havoc will launch it's regular open mic series, *Project Ghostlight*. Held regularly during the shutdown, the series features a professional host and musical guest alongside performers of all ages sharing a selection of text inspired by a three-word theme.

DALLAS HOLOCAUST MUSEUM/CENTER FOR EDUCATION AND TOLERANCE

The Dallas Holocaust and Human Rights Museum is a public educational resource that provides lifechanging lessons to its more than 94,500 annual visitors and program participants, almost half of whom are students. The Museum also ensures that more than 18,000 economically disadvantaged students visit the Museum free of charge each year through the Museum Experience Fund. The Museum seeks to positively impact attitudes and behaviors. As the only Holocaust museum in North Texas, Oklahoma, Louisiana, and Arkansas, the lessons taught at the Museum encourage students and other visitors to be "Upstanders," individuals who stand up for what is right when it would be easier to do nothing. The majority of our student visitors come from the Dallas Independent School District (DISD) as well as Dallas County. The new 55,000 square-foot Museum, which opened on September 18, 2019, anticipates approximately 200,000 annual visitors, more than double the visitorship in its current 6,000 square-foot facility. The museum will also continue to grow the Museum Experience Fund to support scholarships to allow up to 36,000 economically challenged students and Title 1 schools and teachers attend the Museum free of charge in the coming year, which has far exceeded the anticipated 47% increase in requests. The Museum temporarily closed in March 2020, just six months after opening, due to COVID-19 mandates. In response to this closure, the Museum created free virtual education and community programs to bring our important lessons to students, educators, and the community. Virtual programs, available on the

Museum's website, include TEKS-aligned lessons, two virtual summer camps, a virtual special exhibition tour, 3-5 weekly virtual public programs, and virtual student field trips. Due to the success of these programs, which have already reached more than 19,000 students, educators, and participants, they remain available even after the Museum reopened to the public on August 14, 2020. The Museum will resume in-person events when it is deemed safe to do so by city, county, and state officials. The Museum welcomes visitors to the permanent and special exhibitions with proper safety precautions and will continue virtual education and community programs. What has not faltered is our commitment to change behavior through education. The Museum is dedicated to providing a thoughtful space for authentic connection, communication, and reflection, whether physically or virtually.

The Dallas Holocaust Museum is a public educational resource that provides life-changing lessons to its more than 94,500 annual visitors and program participants, almost half of whom are students. The Museum also ensures that more than 18,000 economically disadvantaged students visit the Museum free of charge each year through the Museum Experience Fund. The Museum seeks to positively impact attitudes and behaviors. As the only Holocaust museum in North Texas, Oklahoma, Louisiana, and Arkansas, the lessons taught at the Holocaust Museum encourage students and other visitors to be "Upstanders," individuals who stand up for what is right when it would be easier to do nothing. The majority of our student visitors come from the Dallas Independent School District (DISD) as well as Dallas County. The new 55,000 square-foot Museum anticipates approximately 200,000 annual visitors, more than double the visitorship in its current 6,000 square-foot facility. The museum will also continue to grow the Museum Experience Fund to support the anticipated 47% increase in requests for scholarships to allow up to 25,000 economically challenged students and Title 1 schools and teachers attend the Museum free of charge in the coming year.

DALLAS MUSEUM OF ART

The cultural agency will serve more than 2 million visitors in person and virtually by presenting 4-ticketed exhibitions (including 4 nationally- or internationally-touring exhibitions), numerous smaller-scale exhibitions and installations, and approximately 4,000 educational programs. Free general admission provides the community with access to the Museum's global collection of more than 24,000 works of art, which helps to maintain a diverse audience. The DMA's entire permanent collection has been digitized and made available to the public through the Museum's website and smartphone app. DMA Education Programs will continue to serve visitors on-site at the Museum, off-site at partner sites, and through sustained collaborations that engage populations of all ages, abilities, and other defining circumstances. The Center for Creative Connections ignites curiosity and affirms a multitude of perspectives through dynamic experiences with art, applying a community-centered approach to supporting the DMA's goal of broadening and diversifying its audiences, and creating content that is compelling, engaging and accessible. Family School and Youth Programs will provide opportunities for children from birth through adolescence in early learning classes (which serve ages 0-7), family workshops, summer camps, guided school tours (currently online), tween and teen workshops, a Teen Advisory Council, and Pop-Up Art Spots in the galleries. The Go van Gogh Outreach Program will continue to offer free art presentations to North Texas students and teachers.. The DMA Community Engagement team collaborates with community organizations and residents to develop on- and off-site participatory art experiences that reflect the voices and creativity of Dallas. Access Programs provide for audiences with special needs, including Sensory Kits, for families of children with autism spectrum disorders; resources and programsfor individuals with vision disabilities, individuals with early-stage dementia; and individuals with developmental disabilities. Monthly Late Nights and Second Thursdays with a Twist served visitors until the Museum's closure in March. Virtual Date Night online modules were launched in August to connect with adult audiences as well as new slow looking tours. The DMA will continue to provide Gallery Talks, Tours, and Lectures in which individuals and groups may participate (online and/or in-person as circumstances allow). Arts & Letters Live will feature award-winning authors and artists during in person and virtual talks.

DALLAS WIND SYMPHONY

For the 2019-20 season, the Dallas Wind Symphony (Dallas Winds) performed four subscription season concerts and one holiday special at the Meyerson Symphony Center. The tentatively scheduled free public concert at Fair Park as part of the Fair Park Fourth celebration, was cancelled by Spectra due to COVID restrictions. In connection with the Dallas Winds' long-standing partnership with Dallas ISD, the organization performed six concerts for fifth grade students at Fair Park Music Hall. The Dallas Winds could not present a scheduled concert at the Meyerson Symphony center as the grand finale of Dallas Winds Band Camp due to covid restrictions; and two concerts in connection with the Dallas Winds Honor Band residency at Conrad High School were reduced to one concert because of COVID restrictions. The two-day Invitational Windband Festival scheduled at the Meyerson Center in April was cancelled due to COVID restrictions. The six-day Dallas Winds Band Camp for Dallas ISD students at Booker T. Washington High School in June 2020 was cancelled due to COVID restrictions. The scheduled two semester residency at Conrad High School coaching band students and special needs students from throughout the Dallas ISD under the umbrella title of Dallas Winds Honor Band was reduced to six months due to COVID restrictions. The Dallas Winds in partnership with WRR FM increased the number of Monday Night at the Symphony broadcasts between March – September 2020 reaching a significantly larger audience than was planned for 19/20. Dallas Winds added a new series of live-streamed chamber concerts during the Mar-Sep 2020 period as well as a new series of online workshops for high school band students, both of which increased the size of our audience as projected in the original scope of services.

FINE ARTS CHAMBER PLAYERS

Fine Arts Chamber Players (FACP) serves the community through a series of concerts, post-performance dialogues, and educational outreach programs. FACP's two long-standing concert series are free, open to the public, and traditionally staged in the Dallas Arts District at venues that are accessible by public transportation and are ADA-compliant. Concerts are held in the afternoons to best suit a wide range of ages.

Because of the new, unprecedented reach online content affords (detailed below), FACP served over 25,000 (duplicated, projected) in this grant cycle, more than twice the projected 9,600.

Due to COVID-19 restrictions with public gatherings and public education, adjustments were made to FACP's free programs, beginning in March 2020. Public performances that were cancelled were replaced with other online content, other public concerts were staged virtually, and FACP educational outreach moved to remote learning models. Initially, FACP intended to launch a new initiative in Spring 2020: Beethoven in the Community. These community concerts have been postponed until Spring 2022, at the earliest.

The organization produces Hallam Family Concerts (HFC). These concerts are monthly free chamber music concerts; October-May (excluding December); Saturday afternoons; traditionally staged in the Horchow Auditorium at the Dallas Museum of Art; feature preeminent professional musicians from North Texas. Hallam concerts are followed by CODA, a moderated Q&A with the musicians. The final three HFC of the season (March, April, May 2020) were cancelled. However, new online content was created in the spring and early summer to entertain and reach our audience and new patrons.

FACP also produces the annual Basically Beethoven Festival; weekly free chamber music concerts; Sunday afternoons in July 2020; typically held at Moody Performance Hall; each afternoon includes a Rising Star Recital (gifted student musicians) and a Feature Performance (local, professional musicians). In 2020, the 40th annual series was reimagined as the Basically Beethoven Festival-in-Place: all performances were pre-recorded and premiered on YouTube.com/FineArtsChamberPlayers. Other than the change in location and delivery method, the programs remained the same in content, length, performers, and quality. Only the final concert, which originally featured a singer, changed once that was not advisable due to COVID-related concerns about spread.

The organization will also provide the following free music education programs: Music Residencies (1,100), FACP places Teaching Artists at 3 Dallas schools to provide regular individual and/or small group music instruction, free of charge to students. FACP's educational performance troupes (Dream Collectors and Music A-Z) retired in the 2019-20 school year.

GREATER DALLAS YOUTH ORCHESTRA

Due to COVID-19, the amount of rehearsals were reduced from our anticipated 175 to 166 due to two of our ensembles not rehearsing from March through May, 2020. Most of our ensembles moved to an online format, however for the GDYO and the Philharmonic, our conductors believed their music was too complex to adapt well to online learning. Moreover, we continued to anticipate that we could make up rehearsal sessions for those ensembles during the summer. However, this proved to be impossible. The number of performances we anticipated was reduced from 18 to 13 due to our cancelling performances from March to May, 2020. Our greatest deficit for the past season came under the "Class / Workshop" section, since this represents our community engagement program with the DISD. We began later than normal (in November) due to a change in orchestra teachers at one of the schools we were supposed to have a weekly, year-long residency. We also had to cut short the duration of our residency in all three year-round sites by three months (March through May).

The cultural organization will serve approximately 15,000 people through activities including rehearsals, classes, and concerts. The organization will provide instrumental music training for over 465 young musicians' ages 6 to 18 in nine ensembles. Students receive 60-100 hours of instruction in weekly rehearsals with professional musicians and coaches. The GDYO (flagship orchestra) presents a formal subscription series of 4 concerts at the Meyerson Symphony Center. Throughout the year, the other orchestras will each perform 3-5 concerts at Moody Performance Hall and at the Meyerson. Quartets or other small ensembles average at least 2-4 extra performances for special events. Through its outreach program, the cultural organization will provide community engagement programming to approximately 1500 DISD students who would not ordinarily have the opportunity to receive musical instruction and performance opportunities. Through the Chuck Moore Student Enrichment Fund, the organization will provide new outreach and scholarship opportunities to young musicians from the city of Dallas.

TEATRO HISPANO DE DALLAS

Teatro Hispano de Dallas (Teatro Dallas) will provide four major mainstage events at the Latino Cultural Center and serve approximately 13,000 individuals this year through its programs and events. These include a regional premiere in the fall of the play Villa, a production that explores how humans deal with monuments and architecture associated with trauma. Talkbacks about the content with the actors will be scheduled for the opening. TD will also produce three events for its CO-LAB series, which is a free community-based, interactive project allowing the public to directly engage with artists at nonperformance events. These will include a theater workshop in September called Fissures of Reality, a public art event called Monuments In the City in October, and a world premiere screenning called Theater for Healing in February. These will take palce across diverse neighborhoods and partnering organizations include Top Ten Records and The MAC Gallery. The winter production to follow will be the 18th International Performance Festival, in which two groups representing Lebanon, the U.S. and Mexico will present works at the intersection between theater, music, dance and performance art. A workshop for performers in Middle Eastern dance techniques will be presented during the run of the festival by Lebanese artist Alia Mohammed. Aditionally, Turkish poetry will be presented in a third, free communitybased interactive event with a reception featuring middle eastern food. In the spring and summer, three original virutal works created by Teatro Dallas will celebrate Latinx voices and culture. These three

programs include an original audio paly called Pizcas, which will premiere on May 1st for international labor day and run through June. Pizcas honors migrant workers through the poiginant memories of a migrant child laboring alongside his family in the fields of South Texas in the 1970s. In June, Faces of Cement City will present the untold story of West Dallas in Cement City. The work is based on interviews and film footage, and this original 10-minute documentary will inform the staging of a future, full-length production. In July, Bongo Talks will be created as a thirty minute filmed production with a fifteen minute, live-streaming Q&A with youth ages 5-10. The production is bilingual, for all ages and interactive, and focuses on the importance of imagination and the emotions as a source for coping with stressful situations. This filmed production is aligned with TEKS learning and addresses social -emotional skills through puppets, live action, and an original musical score. In August, TD will produce one filmed, pilot poetry project that will serve as the basis for a future series called POEISIS, which will celebrate the rich tradition of Latinx poetry in indigenous, caribbean, Spanish and Ladino languages without Englsih translation. This virtual poetry series will begin with the poem of Porfirio Barba Jacob, a lesser known Colombian poet. All virtual content will be free and distributed widely through our platforms which include constant contact, FB, and our website.

The winter production to follow will be the 18th International Performance Festival, in which three groups from Germany, Boston, and Mexico will present works at the intersection between theater, music, dance and performance art. A workshop for performers in circus and physical theater techniques will be presented during the run of the festival by Colombian artist Roberto Diaz. In the spring, an original work created by Teatro Dallas and playwright Bernardo Mazon Daher will present the untold story of West Dallas in Cement City. The work is based on interviews and film footage, and an original 10-minute documentary will be presented in the lobby during the run of the production. A weeklong spring theater camp will also be presented at the Latino Cultural Center, where students will explore a variety of acting and vocal techniques, write original scripts, create masks and explore international theater traditions culminating in a final, public demonstration. It will include approximately 26 dance performances/events by dance companies representing four countries, and one Dallas debut, in addition to several special presentations, the

TITAS favorite Big Barre, normally an outdoor dance class for up to 300 participants that will be held in the Winspear Opera House Lobby with Malandain Ballet Biarritz on February 8. TITAS felt the impact of the pandemic immediately. Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater (AAADT) cancelled their TITAS performances and engagement activities as soon as the company arrived in Dallas on Thursday, March 12. Our last live event, an Artist Salon with AAADT associate artistic director, Matthew Rushing, took place at Arts Mission Oak Cliff on March 12. While over 150 people registered for the event, sixty did attend even amid the confusion about shelter-in-place mandates, etc. Due to scheduling challenges and gathering and travel restrictions amid the CoVid-19 crisis, TITAS had to replace or cancel an additional three international dance company performances and engagement activities scheduled for the 2019-2020 season and another four international companies for the 2020-2021 season. Beginning August 2020, TITAS renewed focus on our collective communities with innovative ways to enrich our communities amid, and post, the COVID-19 crisis. In conjunction with the 2020:21 season announcement in August, TITAS introduced, executed, and is marketing a biweekly virtual salon series that is offering important conversations between TITAS and other national arts leaders. In addition, TITAS initiated a bi-monthly DFW Dance/Music Virtual Roundtable to offer local artists a forum to talk about the challenges and solutions associated with continuing to work through the global health crisis. In general, TITAS participates in numerous internship programs including the Mayor's summer internship program, SMU, and Booker T. Washington High School for the Performing and Visual Arts (BTWHSPVA). This summer BTWHSVA approved an 8-week paid internship with TITAS. THE BRUCE WOOD DANCE CO., INC.

Consultant presented an in person, live, weekend dance production entitled, Harvest, at Moody Performance Hall on November 15 and 16, 2019 and streamed a virtual 10 Years | Distance Unites prooduction commemorating BWD's 10 years on social media platforms in June 2020. Productions were open-to-the-public events of high caliber, original, contemporary choreography. Harvest featured three dance pieces, Bruce Wood's Follow Me, a tribute to the U.S. Infantry, the world premiere, Live, Love, Laugh by Princess Grace Choreography Honoree and Jacob's Pillow Choreography Fellow Bryan Arias, and the world premiere of Joy Bollinger's In My Your Head, a perspective on today's political spirit. Ten Years | Distance Unites featured the world premiere ALLONE, a video comprised of seven short dances performed throughout prominent Dallas spaces reflecting the new normal. Harvest was preceded by preshow talks with the artists in the lobby and post-show Q+A's in the theater. BWD held two in-person, live studio events related to Harvest in order to engage our Dallas audience with insights into the process of choreographing and mounting the production. From October through March 3, 2020, BWD also offered free in-person dance classes twice a week at women's addiction rehabilitation facility, Nexus Recovery Center in a symbiotic effort to provide tools for healing and informing about upcoming performances. During this same timeframe, free in-peron dance classes were held twice a week for children at Mosaic Family Services, a shelter for the homeless and once per week at Heart House which serves refugees . We pivoted to virtual programming in March and produced a wide array of programs on the BWD Facebook, website, Vimeo, and Instagram platforms. We also streamed four archival works, Carved in Stone, Forbidden Paths, Follow Me, and In My Your Head. In July, BWD produced our inaugural, online 4-day summer dance intensive, WOODWORKS. On August 28, we performed in our first live show since March, a collaborative response to today's happenings in Trinity Groves, Twilight at the Tin Star, a drive-in theater-in-the-round outdoor space. TURTLE CREEK CHORALE, INC.

The world-renowned Turtle Creek Chorale (TCC) -- the most recorded male chorus in the world -- is celebrating its 40th Anniversary Season during this grant period with a revised schedule of programs inclusing a slate of one mainstage concert, three virtual chorus videos, an online educational program, and new Vodcast (podcast with video option).

The 2019 holiday season featured the Chorale's signature holiday performances with "40 Years of Fa La La" and featured a newcomer to the Dallas arts scene, Chloe Agnew of Celtic Woman. These four sold-out performances were held at the Moody Performance Hall where the TCC served approximately 4,000 patrons, including more than 200 complimentary tickets to individuals living with HIV/AIDS, senior citizens, high school choral students, and individuals from low-income areas.

Before the pandemic shutdown, the TCC provided a powerful educational workshop for the youth of Booker T. Washington High School for the Performing Arts through the *You Are Light Project*, an initiative designed to address suicide prevention, mental health issues, and bullying. Due to the pandemic, this program is now being taken online with a comprehensive set of modules available through Canvass to all teachers in the Dallas area and beyond, allowing us to scale this much-needed program to even more students across the city and country.

In September 2020, the TCC will launch "OffStage: Concerts and Conversations" – a new Vodcast (podcast with video option) featuring live musical performances surrounded by entertaining banter and enlightening conversation on various topics like racism, suicide prevention, LGBTQ+ equality, the COVID-19 pandemic, and more. An episode of the Vodcast will drop every two weeks and will be available on all podcast platforms (Apple, Spotify, etc.) and YouTube.

Since March of 2020, we have produced two virtual choir presenions and shared on YouTube and other social media outlets. We have two more scheduled to drop in the month of September with one being a partnership with the Women's Chorus of Dallas.

While the COVID-19 pandemic has caused a shutdown of rehearsals and performances for the past six months, the Turtle Creek Chorale is committed to fulfilling our mission through virtual programming and new mediums of delivery, with the plan to resume in-person programming later this year.

The world-renowned Turtle Creek Chorale (TCC) -- the most recorded male chorus in the world -- is celebrating its 40th Anniversary Season during this grant period with three mainstage concerts, along with numerous outreach performances and powerful educational workshops in and for the Dallas community. Two of these concert series will be held at the Moody Performance Hall with a one-night-only anniversary event at the Meyerson Symphony Center. The TCC will serve approximately 9,000 individuals during its

40th season, including more than 500 complimentary tickets to individuals living with HIV/AIDS, senior citizens, high school choral students, and individuals from low-income areas.

The TCC will provide a wide variety of repertoire including our audience favorites of our 40-year history, holiday classics, and music dedicated to LGBTQ+ heroes. The 2019 holiday season will feature the Chorale's signature holiday performances with "40 Years of Fa La La" and feature a newcomer to the Dallas arts scene, Chloe Agnew of Celtic Woman. In Spring 2020, we will honor and celebrate the lives of lesser-known LGBTQ+ heroes throughout history with the regional premiere of a new choral musical from Tony Award winning composer Andrew Lippa, "Unbreakable." This historical account of the role of LGBTQ+ people will inspire, educate, entertain, and solidify our role as cultural leaders in the Dallas LGBTQ+ community. In June of 2020, we will return to the Meyerson Symphony Center for our 40th Anniversary one-night-only event — "Classic: The Songs that Made the TCC!" The TCC will also provide powerful educational workshops for the youth of our city through the You Are Light Project, an initiative designed to address suicide prevention, mental health issues, and bullying.
